


Suck up! Only 59,999 to go!

The many months of logistical planning for the "PU of the century" finally paid off, when over two thousand Hashers from about three hundred Hash House Harriers and Harriettes clubs around the world, gathered at Pattaya beach resort over the Easter holiday period, to run and have fun.

If you weren't there you will never begin to appreciate it! Every previous InterHash record was smashed. The Bangkok H3 and Pattaya H3, joined by the Bangkok Harriettes put on a corker! Forty hares laid sixteen runs for the visitors. Two Maersk Line 40' refrigerated containers, kept

more than 2,500 cases of newly launched Singha Gold beer iced for the occasion at the the registration and On-On-On- sites. Nearly one hundred buses were required to shuttle Hashers around the Pattaya hinterland. Some twelve thousand pieces of mail were handled by the On Secretariat, where a ten megabyte IBM-XT look-a-like was required to handle the magnitude of the event.

Grand affair

Friday morning saw InterHashers collected from their Bangkok hotels and whisked the two hour journey to Asia's premier holiday resort, in a police escorted convoy. Now that is class! It typified the kind of attention to detail on which the organisers had focused. As the fleets of buses rolled into the unsuspecting resort, disgorging their loads outside varying classes of hotels, the atmosphere elevated a notch every electric hour. One could not avoid being somewhat awestruck. Hash T-shirts were everywhere. InterHash '86 had arrived!

At the Grand Palace Hotel and Convention Center a team of pretty receptionists professionally handled the registrations. They found it fun too! Is that Kok Dat Chew from Singapore or Chew Dat Kok from Tawau? But there are two Capital

H3's, one in Australia and one New Zealand. Query by query, twelve girls sorted out the check-in. Most had already paid their US\$80. — , but for the few who had not, US100. — was the late tab, as it was for some sixty who "just turned up" out of the blue unannounced.

A special InterHash '86 back-pack awaited almost everyone! The contents were great! Big InterHash beach/bath towel, a novelty umbrella hat, hat and jacket patch, commemorative T-shirt, big colour souvenir programme of events, a printed beer glass, 'Explore' — a guide to Pattaya, bottle opener and numbered registration disc, as well as varying Nivea shower gel and creme soap, Daktarin for foot rot and a very thoughtful Imodium sample for stopping the runs! This well stocked bag soon had broken straps dangling from the weight. Obviously a lot of thought and attention had been paid to give people useful items. Certainly, a real attempt to provide value for money was being made. Late sign-ons would receive their kit later. We can confirm that these are now ordered, being boxed by the organisers and shipped in July.

Frederick "Horse" Thomson, an original Hashman of 1938 vintage, registered as Kuala

Lumpur H3 and was accorded top VIP status throughout his visit to Thailand. He quickly spotted David Scourse, a Hashman with twenty-eight years running to his credit. "Good Lord!" he exclaimed, "are all these people with us?" He stared around in amazement, watching new arrivals opening their goody-bags in the huge convention centre.

Out on the Sea Terrace, the whole day had been spent in preparing for the Reception and Thai Village Buffet Dinner. As the participants arrived in regulation club T-shirt, it was first a cold Gold, and then a renewal of many old friendships. But where was John Duncan?

InterHash GM Tim Hughes came riding in atop a giant tusker. Harriettes were treated to a lengthy flash of the pachyderm's colossal equipment, whereupon it evacuated and flooded the area in front of the stage.

InterHash '82 and '84 Hashmasters, Ron Strachan and Ole Vigerstol, were briefly introduced to the sea of smiling faces and that was that. No lengthy speeches or boring diatribes. Just a big welcome. Dinner was served. Get into it!

And they did. A fantastic array of food had been laid on for the visitors. Not your normal hash. Simply mounds of excitingly presented foods,

whose tastes still linger. The reaction from the couple of thousand diners was ecstatic. "A display like this must have cost a fortune" exclaimed more than one stunned Hasher. It did. About US\$20,000.- was lavishly expended on the Thai Village Theme Buffet alone.

Further attempts to impress the visitors to Thailand were still to come. A display of colourful traditional and classical dance had the cameras flashing. The graceful Thai female has to be seen to be believed!

A poofter show that would have had bottles hurled in any other land, managed to bewilder more than a few, whilst the dated acid rock of Lam Morrison, took one back to the days of the late Jimi Hendrix. Unique entertainment to say the least, which culminated in a pyrotechnic display which could have been seen across the other side of the Gulf of Siam. How the crowd loved it! Applause and acclamation.

With the evening's allocation of free beer being guzzled by 10pm, the South Pattaya bar district was invaded. At dawn Hashers were still coming home! Pattaya is, without a doubt a Hashman's paradise. Time and time again, as the event unfolded, more than gentle hints were passed to keep InterHash at Pattaya. Where else in Asia can

InterHash be sucked into the system along with the Thailand Open Golf Championship and an Easter international motor racing calendar, all at the same time! The town was filled with revellers. If the city corporation had thought about organising itself, then a festival would certainly almost rival carnival time in Rio de Janeiro. (Ed. The Rio H3. The mind boggles!).

The runs

By two-thirty on Saturday, the Grand Palace Hotel car park was packed with buses and Hashers. This was it. Day two of the single largest-ever international assembly in Thailand. And the Hash did it! The largest "unconvention" in the world. Horns were blowing, people were laughing and shouting. Buses marked short, medium and long runs rapidly filled. Engines burst into life. One by one, the Hash fleet of buses and beer-laden pick up trucks wound its way

out of the complex, split into fifteen "run units" and headed off to the secret runs start points. Strange and entirely unexpected by the organisers, Run # 13 did not get anybody on both days. All the hard work put in over the weeks prior and on the day were in vain. The buses gathered dust. The hares dejectedly looked into the bottoms of their bottles. "It should have been Run 12A" said one to the other.

Having designated the run areas from Landsat 2 satellite photographs months in advance, Run Masters Frank Benfield (Pattaya) and Bob Boulter had designated a wide area in which to run. Even so, as we learned later, one run crossed into another and the biggest laugh of all, was when one pack ended up at another run's buses.

Long runs were very long and short. One short run lasted nearly three hours, whilst medium runs were never medium. The trails varied immensely from open country to wooded and shaded undulating country. The heat was a problem. Over 35 degrees Celcius. A long beach run was of the A to B Type. It managed to stuff almost everyone. Run #5 was a complete cock-up caused



Down-Downs for the hares.


by the front-runners failing to back track and find the checkback, whilst next day it was lauded as a "great" run. The toughest run on Saturday was undoubtedly laid by Bob Boulter and Tony Lovell. When the word got out later that evening and the following day, double the numbers showed up to run it on Sunday. Some had to swim lakes as did Hashers on Run #11. But whatever the run you did, you chose it yourself. Undoubtedly, what makes InterHash work is the really international mix of people on any run, Planned on the basis of 3,000 attendees, the much lower actual attendance gave plenty of room to move on the fifteen runs that operated. Large packs, but manageable. Even with Run #13 missing from the plan, there were plenty of seats on buses and generally lots of room to move.

Giant On-On-On!

The newly opened Ocean Marina had been well briefed. Paying for all the chalets for the weekend to keep any other visitors away, proved to be a sensible ploy. "Oily" and Bjarne had spent the best part of a week on site, making preparations

for the invasion. Toilets were dug, carpenters made seats, a huge stage and backdrop was built and sound and lighting set up. The hammering and banging went on for days. Was the Michael Jackson concert coming to the eastern seaboard? The building continued unabated. On Friday and Saturday the caterers from Nipa Lodge and Orchid Lodge Hotels, under the watchful eye of Alex Siddon, kept the crews working throughout the heat of the day.


At five-thirty the first buses arrived. A second Maersk Line refrigerated container had been positioned and plugged in two days previously, and watched by two heavily armed guards. The keys had gone back with the driver, so the heavy padlocks were acetylene torched. The distribution points were stocked, more buses arrived. Within an hour, over one thousand Hashers had returned from the "sticks". Thirsty. Tired. Hot.

A constant dust cloud at the main gate, signified

yet more buses arriving. The crowd swelled. Now over two thousand milling around, drinking cold Gold or Pepsi. Both official main sponsors for the event, as was Smith + Nephew, the Elastoplast (or Tensoplast in Thailand) company. Palls of smoke from over thirty food stations indicated that the burgers were ready. Plain simple food. Many said too plain. Where was the Thai food? There wasn't any. This was Hash at its simplest, catering to a large number of people with virtually no choice of menu. But Sunday's menu choice was a big improvement.

Frank Benfield, Pattaya's amiable Hash Master took the stage, and for the next three days, if you include the Monday run, showed the crowd he was in control. For fear of the big man, who stuffs bottles up the arseholes of anybody who throws things on stage, a contented and replete audience sat down to the evening's entertainment. Tim "Magic" Hughes, who put this lot together, came out to introduce Frederick "Horse" Thomson. An original founder member in Kuala Lumpur in 1938, who admits to having run as early as 1933, "Horse" was visibly moved by the occasion. Now almost eighty years old, he told the crowd to keep having fun. He estimated that he had notched up over one hundred runs with the Mother Hash. When applying for the necessary registration that societies require in Malaysia, he noted with a grin the original aims of the Hash House Harriers, "to run and get as pissed as possible in as many Chinese suburbs of Kuala Lumpur as could be managed". From the audience "Horse" was presented with various badges and pins, prompting him to remark that he had not been decorated so much since the service. Here he was, large as life, and cracking jokes about Hash with the Hash. His big disappointment was that both Cecil Lee, now in U.K., and "Torch" Bennett, retired in Durban, were for one reason or another unable to accept Tim's invitation to guest the occasion. Tim did, however, announce that they had both written and sent their best wishes, hoping that InterHash would be the huge success it deserved. "I'm absolutely amazed at the number of people here" he was heard to say over and over again.

The entertainment got underway. Difficult to explain, and since a video is currently in

production and will be available in August, one should not attempt to put it to paper. Highlights were undoubtedly Copenhagen H3's routine which inevitably left them starkers on stage, except for their green wigs and horny helmets. Jakarta H3, came up with its "Hey! Jig-a-jig, Stuff a little pig" and showered the front seated rows with everything imaginable. The big Trojan pig stage centrepiece had been held at H. M. Customs, import duties assessment pending "negotiation". "It's only a f***ing pig," said Ron Strachan. "What's the f***ing problem?"

"The Sydney girls always come" was the down-under Harriettes offering. It raised big cheers from the audience, as they watched the Aussie chorus line sing and dance. Brunei's Hashmen formed a human pyramid into "The Wild Man of Borneo". The act was slow to get moving and almost got slung off. However, it recovered when an LBFM jumped on stage and finished off the act.

DESERT HHH singing "I wish they all could be Middle Eastern girls" was great. Sung to a Beach Boys hit, the chorus line had the back row girls in veils and black chadri opening them to reveal almost nothing, as the front row guys ducked.

The overly long World Down Down Championship followed. As if there was a shortage of beer. Over one hundred wankers decided to get in line to drink eight Singha Gold beers. The mug itself was a Jakarta Hash gift. In future years at InterHash events The Jakarta Jug will be the standard mug. Suffice to say that after far too many attempts, eventually someone came through to shatter the evening's best. "Mongo" from Auckland came through with a non-drip 16.19 seconds. Robbie "McLicker" McNaught, a Pania Plodders Hashman, also from New Zealand drank his in 15.65 secs but was penalised one half second for spillage. The previous record of 22 seconds by Stuart "Fireman" Murray at InterHash '84 in Sydney had been completely destroyed.

Tinny Cobby, a Surrey Harriette sank a ladies' mug in 20.18 seconds, just beating Pinky's 22.83 which placed Toowoomba in second slot. Then the stage was washed down and the show continued.

Top Venue

Most drifted back to Pattaya at this stage. The beer was going down slowly. No doubt the tropical climate had taken its toll and the organisers were becoming worried that there would be beer left over after the event. Back in South Pattaya the fun continued again until dawn.


You see Pattaya seems not to have any rules or hangups of the west. Everything frowned upon or simply not talked about, is just done here. With a night population of tens of girls to every male, bars open until you walk away from them and a genuine love of "having a good time regardless", InterHash in this resort could not fail. Certainly the Caligula and Baby bars had their biggest take ever. BJ's bar conservatively had several hundred patrons every night, as did the Wild Elephant and Nyhaven (all hares' establishments).

Whilst it will take some time to finalise matters before going to audit, the latest statistics showed that 3,019 advance registrations were received at the On Secretariat. Of these, just under 2,100 actually paid. Nearly 400 advised the organisers that they had to cancel. Whilst 600 simply did not take the trouble to advise anybody that they would not be coming. It was a good job that the planners did not order 2,500 of each giveaway, otherwise

this superb event would have ended as the most monumental Hash disaster of all time. "You can always order more items and mail them later. Rather this, than telling the brewery you cannot pay for all of the beer, because you have US\$20,000.- tied up in promotional items!" said the GM.

DEAR TIM,

THE PURPOSE OF THIS LETTER IS TO COMMENT ON SEVERAL ASPECTS OF INTERHASH 86, KNOWING THAT HARRIER INTERNATIONAL IS THE BEST MEDIUM FOR REACHING THE WIDEST POSSIBLE HASH CIRCLE(PUN INTENDED).

FIRSTLY, ON BEHALF OF PATTAYA'S BOTH HASHES, I WOULD LIKE TO THANK THE NUMEROUS HASHERS WHO TOOK THE TIME TO EXPRESS GRATITUDE AND CONGRATULATIONS TO ME FOR A SUCCESSFUL INTERHASH 86 BOTH IN WRITING AND IN PERSON PRIOR TO LEAVING PATTAYA. I SHOULD POINT OUT OF COURSE THAT BANGKOK H3 WERE THE HOST HASH AND THE PATTAYA HASHES WERE FORTUNATE ENOUGH TO BE OF SOME ASSISTANCE IN THIS MOST SATISFYING INTERHASH. I SHOULD FURTHER POINT OUT THAT MANY OF THE HASHERS MENTIONED ABOVE ADDRESSED ME AS TIM, WHICH COMMENTS I TOOK AS COMPLIMENTARY.

SECONDLY, I WOULD LIKE TO CORRECT A MISCONCEPTION PUBLISHED IN THE BANGKOK MONDAY HASHEET AND AUTHORED BY AN ANONYMOUS HARRIER FROM THE LION CITY HASH, CONCERNING THE PATTAYA H3 RUN ON MONDAY 31 MAR 86. THE ASSERTION WAS THAT THE PATTAYA H3 HAD BENEFITED FINANCIALLY BY USING LEFTOVERS FROM IH 86. I WANT TO STATE QUITE FIRMLY THAT PATTAYA H3 DID USE LEFTOVERS FROM IH 86. HOWEVER WE PAID THE FULL PRICE FOR ALL OF THE GOODS USED AT THE MONDAY RUN. THIS SITUATION WAS BENEFICIAL RATHER THAN DETRIMENTAL TO THE INTERHASH COMMUNITY AS IT HELPED THE IH 86 COMMITTEE AVOID INCURRING A FINANCIAL DEFICIT.

THIRDLY, CONCERNING THE BAHT 400 PRICE CHARGED AS OPPOSED TO THE BAHT 150 WHICH APPEARED IN THE IH 86 MAGAZINE. THE EDITOR OF THIS PUBLICATION, WHO PRODUCED A BRILLIANT MAGAZINE, WAS UNABLE TO PRINT AN UP TO DATE PRICE DUE TO PUBLISHING DEADLINES. THE REASON FOR THE PRICE INCREASE HAS ALREADY BEEN EXPLAINED IN THE PRECEDING PARAGRAPH. YOUR READERS CAN BE ASSURED THAT PATTAYA'S H3 ARE NO RICHER OR POORER THAN ANY OTHER HASH I HAVE RUN WITH DURING A HASH CAREER OF MORE THAN 600 RUNS. THEREFORE TO BE TITLED THE RICHEST HASH IN THE WORLD DOES NOT NECESSARILY MEAN A HASH WHICH IS WELL OFF.

FOURTHLY, THE GOOD LADY SPEAKS OF A LACK OF ORGANISATION AT THE MONDAY RUN. I OFFER NO APOLOGY OR EXPLANATION FOR THIS LACK OF ORGANISATION. RATHER I WOULD SAY IT WAS MOST DELIBERATELY ABSENT, AS TO INTRODUCE IT WOULD BE MOST REMISS OF ME AND AGAINST ALL THAT THE HASH HOUSE HARRIERS STANDS OR FALLS OVER FOR.



"G"

In August 1934 I arrived at Singapore on the P. & O. ship "Rajputana" to join the now defunct firm of Chartered Accountants, Evatt & Co. As we drew alongside and were looking over the rail, a ship-board friend said "You're in luck, they've sent Gispert to meet you and be your mentor". How true, he helped me enormously and we became good friends. After some years in Singapore "G" was transferred to the Malacca office and I went to Kuala Lumpur. In early 1938 I spent two months with "G" in Malacca and joined him in the weekly run of the Springgit Harriers, so called after Pringgit Hill, the enclave of Malayan Civil Servants in Malacca and who formed most of the runners. This was the seed which sprouted into the H³ when "G" finally came to K.L., the only difference was that the Springgits had female runners and we were male chauvinistic pigs in those days. The H³ flourished and in 1941 "G" who was an Englishman went on leave to Australia (which probably accounts for him being accused of being Australian in some early records), and then war broke out in the East. "G"'s leave was up and at that late stage there was a ban on people returning to Singapore, but "G" overcame that and came

back to do his duty. He was a Captain in the Volunteers, who by this time were largely disbanded, so dropped a "pip" to join the Argylls. Meanwhile Cecil Lee and I (together in the Volunteer Armoured Cars) were on the big retreat South and on reaching Johore were attached to the Argylls who were on the final inner defence of the Causeway on to Singapore Island. News had reached us that "G" was with the Argylls so after harbouring our cars, Cecil and I set out on foot to look "G" up. As we reached the H.Q. a flight of 25 Jap bombers appeared overhead and discharged their load. Cecil and I leaped into the nearest slit trench and to our amazement "G" suddenly dropped into the other end. We now move

on to 1985, last year, when I was in Scotland at a small place Port Appin on the West Coast. I found out that Brigadier Stewart, head of the Appin Stewart Clan and Colonel of the Argylls during the Malayan campaign, lived nearby, so I looked him up. He is over 90 now, very fit but deaf, and we had a very pleasant session, reminiscing. He showed me his book about the campaign, in which "G" figures prominently, he was the Mortar Officer and was killed in an ambush the day after Cecil and I last saw him. The Brigadier spoke very highly of him both as an officer and an individual. I wonder if "G" ever started a Chapter of the Hash in that place above to which he most surely went !

INTERHASH '86

The criticisms of this fiasco abound; there was too much beer, too many women, not enough sleep, too long runs, and so on - *ad infinitum*. To quote the words of one of our company; "This was the most boring weekend I ever had in my life." And this was said, mind you, as this same Hasher was being carried onto the plane in a catatonic state mumbling something to do with "Number 19." Try as we might, we have not been able to fathom the celestial significance of that number.

It all started on Thursday, March 27 when some 35 stalwarts - including four hardcore reps from the Harriettes, replete with Hashing gear and pigs (see below) boarded various flights out of Jakarta bound for the 7th wonder of the Orient, "Bang Cock," in turn, located only a stone's-throw from the seaside resort of Pattaya - as in that famous bit of repartee: "Knock knock," "Who's there?" "Pattaya," "Pattaya who?" "I wanna Pattaya ass, so lets have another...."

Most of us went on Thai flight 414 which deposited us in Bangkok around 11 PM Thursday night. A few however, left earlier so as to prepare the local populace for our arrival. Speaking of preparation, credit should go to Wee Ronnie for his masterful organization of the Jakarta contingent. For two weeks before we left, he could be seen wandering around in a daze mumbling, "It's all under control, it's all under control." Needless to say, that was the last thing that was under any semblance of control for the rest of the weekend.

After a refreshing and restful (sic) night at the brand new Shangri-La Hotel - so new that the staff still didn't know where the rooms were, explaining the reason for the "cheap" price - we departed Friday morning for Pattaya, the venue for the weekend's festivities.

Here we joined some 2,300 other Hashers of all sizes and shapes (including some very interesting shapes from Copenhagen). Admittedly, there was some worry amongst us about the ability of Pattaya to accomodate what was by far the largest Interhash to date. But, to put it all in perspective, two weeks before our arrival, the US 6th (or is it 7th?) fleet had visited with over 10,000 randy sailors. Demonstrating Pattaya's absorbtive capacity (the wet sponge effect), they haven't been heard of since. Major repairs to premises and personnel were apparently all completed in plenty of time for Interhash. This must be one of the finer sites for your larger-than-average tour group, particularly those with thoughts of a more rudimentary nature.

Friday afternoon saw registration, and Friday night, an introductory bash - complete with Thai food, Thai music and dancing, and Thai pacyderm - on the seafront terrace of the Grand Palace Hotel. It also saw our start on what would prove to be a never-ending stream of bottles of Singha Gold (the local excuse for piss). This, along with Kloster, the other local excuse, was guaranteed to keep us all in that continuous sonambulant condition where one is lucky enough to remember one's own name, let alone, day of the week, jock size, or other critical items of information.

Following this, it was off for the first of many trips to "The Strip," as the famous nightlife section of South Pattaya is jocularly known. It is not necessary to dwell in great detail on this aspect of Interhash, except to say that it epitomized the true meaning of boredom. Over four thousand glazed eyeballs were proof enough of this. Places like BJ's, Caligula, Butterfly Bar, and so on, kept us all suitably bored until well into the wee hours of the morning. Further, and more detailed, descriptions of just how boring this all was can be obtained (for a small fee) from either Tom Edinborough or the Silver Fox.

Saturday saw the first run, with the busses off at 2 PM. Before that, however, was the frantic effort on the part of several of the company to salvage the Jakarta skit, due for presentation on Saturday night. The setting for this goes back to the Friday when it was discovered that the central fixture of the act (namely "THE BIG PIG") was unlikely to clear Thai customs in time for the performance. For the uninitiated, THE BIG PIG was a Trojan creation of Chris ("Hey jig a jig, Fuck a little pig") Beebe designed to perform various obscene functions (orchestrated by special effects master Philthe) for the delight and admiration of your typical discerning Hash audience. The reason for the problem was that some twit in Jakarta (who at present will remain nameless) decided to declare the pig as a toy - which happens to dutyable at 100% CIF in Thailand. While the pig had no dutyable value, the shipping charge was quoted as \$950, so that customs required the same to release the monstrosity into our possession. Sunday the Master of Balikpapan Hash played 'mine host' with the highlight being one of the Pattaya Hares (female) drinking all-comers under the table.



THE GRAVE

Both Saturday and Sunday the main ON-ON was held at the Marine Park, a future marina, hotel and residence complex, which, at present, includes a two or three-hectare field just right for the 2000 or so staggering idiots that made it there each night. Good Hash food, plenty of cold piss, and the stage acts (MC'd by ex-Jakarta stallwart Frankie Benfield) made a superb setting for priming expectant Hashmen (and ladies) for the following extremely boring ON-ON-ON in South Pattaya (see above and below and anywhere else you care to look).

Two unnamed guests at the Grand Palace would like to thank Mike Twitchitt for his impromptu portrayal of a Greek statue in the hotel corridor on Sunday afternoon.

Mike would like to thank John Moreland and Fraser Wood for their Academy Award class performance in their hotel room. Keep the door open more often guys.

Fraser would like to thank the individuals who so kindly gave him a pet snake; "Cute little feller, just what I always wanted to find in my Nikes," he was heard to say.

Tony Walker would like to thank the friendly local bouncer who gave him a free lesson in Thai boxing (hope the ribs are healing nicely), and for giving him the chance to wear his favorite disguise (complete with stunning brunette wig) the following night.

The Silver Fox would like to thank all the girls of Pattaya for providing him with "the most memorable birthday in my life."

Back in Bangkok it was 'buy off the wife and/or girlfriend time' - searching for that little something that would prevent those searching questions about just what went on for the rest of the weekend; followed by a farewell visit to Patpong, Bangkok's slightly more famous version of "The Strip." which is just coming upon us,... and will make our vegetables grow like mad,... and you will be able to see why I am a happy person.







How to detect manufacturing faults

The next thing to look for is manufacturing faults.

- **The heel test:** Place the shoes together and view them from the back. The seam line should be perpendicular to the ground.

- **The Pencil test:** Place the shoe on a flat surface. Use a pencil and push against the shoe on the inside. The shoe should not rock sideways.



Lacing up your runners

There are many variations but the most common being the circular and criss-cross methods.

Type A, is the criss-cross method. It gives you an even pull when you tighten the lace.

Type B, the circular method, tends to twist the shoe in one direction.

As the running shoe is made of light material, it is better to use the criss-cross method so that your shoe is never askew on your feet. ♣


I would drive, he snarled incoherently and seized a large spanner, and had to be forcibly restrained from doing me a serious injury.

It was quite some time before the wheels started rolling again.




INTERHASH '88

At the recent world meeting of InterHash On Secs held at the Grand Palace Hotel and Convention Center in Pattaya resort, Thailand, it was unanimously decided to accept the bid from Bali to host InterHash '88

Chairman of the meeting Tim Hughes, whilst acknowledging the firm desire and demand to keep an event in Thailand, stated that if possible he would like to see InterHash move around. Already Angeles City HHH are looking seriously at bringing IH to the Philippines in 1990; the one hundredth anniversary of San Miguel Brewery.

Inviting presentations from the floor, he asked that each representative confirm that the airport had sufficient capacity and services, that ground handling would be fairly reasonable and that there was adequate hotel accommodation available.

San Diego HHH, represented by David (Van Go) Painter, made a strong bid to bring InterHash out of Asia and into sunny California. It received due attention and interest, although air fares would become a burden for many. But the idea of a cruise ship for the On-Ons was certainly novel.

The Singapore bid involved combining the talents of both Singapore and Seletar HHH's. However, those who listened and questioned were not impressed sufficiently. It became obvious that Singapore's overly regulated society might severely limit the success of an InterHash. "Would we have to pick up the paper after the run?" was one memorable question from the floor!


New Delhi had written to Bangkok with a firm proposal to

host '88 but immediately dropped it once they had experienced the Friday and Saturday in Pattaya. "There is no way we could follow this" remarked their representative.

A telex to Thailand in February from Penang Hash asking to be considered did not materialise into a firm bid.

Victor Mason's presentation was short and concise. "We can organise it" he said. "Our running country is superb. We might be a bit uncompetitive with Bangkok and Angeles with tarts, but if you want it, you can get it." "Nightjar" closed by saying "so thumbs extrapolate and come and celebrate."

And so, voting for destinations in alphabetical order, Bali was clearly and unanimously confirmed.

5TH INTERHASH THAILAND '86

Pattaya Beach Resort 28-31 March

It's an amazing thing that anyone from London H3 actually made it to InterHash '86, judging by what some people were doing to avoid it - buying expensive new cars, tearing knee ligaments, emigrating to Bermuda, etc.

T'General & Mushrooms blazed the trail to Bangkok, enduring a flight in the company of loads of wankers from Surrey, Wessex, Berkshire & East Grinstead. Sharky & Warren succeeded in drinking the plane dry half to Karachi, Gurney managed the odd twitch of the lips (one of these days he'll manage a smile), and Rene "Mrs Mad Dog" Petre threw up within 2 microseconds of leaving the ground. Harriers put Pattaya back on its feet

Many hotels in Pattaya are enjoying full occupancy thanks to the influx of hashers. Last night's get-together at the Ocean Marina was to be highlighted by a beer-drinking contest and

other party activities. At least two truckloads of beer and soft drinks have arrived in Pattaya since Friday, followed by a large, refrigerated trailer.

Today there will be a replay of yesterday's activities, and tomorrow, when most runners will be leaving Pattaya, there will be a special Pattaya Hash run starting from Sala Alcazar. The event will wind up the official part of the Hash House Harriers activities at the resort.

On Friday, a large number of hashers

showed up at the Grand Palace Hotel for an evening of fun.

The preliminary gathering also featured lively entertainment from Lam Morrison's "Acid Rock" band, a Nongnui Village cultural show and an Alcazar Cabaret performance.

One hasher from Czechoslovakia who has been to four Interhashes commented: "This is the biggest and the best. Reagan and Gorbachev should have come."

There was general agreement that the international meet took place in the truest Hash tradition — a warm, friendly atmosphere and plenty of running and beer.

Hashing today has really come 'On-On'

PATTAYA — Fifty years ago, English gentlemen in Colonial Malaya, much to the bewilderment of local villagers, ran through steamy, snake-infested jungles pursuing fictitious "hares" and yelling "On, On."

The Hash House Harriers, as the British expatriates called themselves, did it for their own amusement, to baffle the locals and to work off the weekend's caloric and alcoholic intake.

The sport was never meant to be a serious or competitive undertaking. But today there are an estimated 50,000 Hash House Harriers in more than 600 Chapters in 92 countries and territories — including Antarctica, said Tim Hughes, organizer of the Fifth Inter-Hash.

The Inter-Hash, held over the Easter weekend at this seaside resort, is a sort of World's Cup Hashing. It drew 2,500 participants who flew in from 60 countries.

The First Inter-Hash, held in 1978 in Hong Kong, attracted 750 runners. Attendance at the next, set for the Indonesian Island of Bali in 1988, is expected to exceed 3,000.

In Hashing, runners, or "hounds," try to follow a tricky trail laid by a "hare." The trail often ends abruptly at spots called "checks," but must resume within a radius of 91 metres (100 yards).

Leaders of the pack shout "checking" and fan out to locate the continuing trail, which can be marked by paper, chalk, flour or ink, depending on conditions. When it is found, the cry, "On-On" rallies the runners.

They run through mine fields, albeit marked, in the Falkland Islands, in jungles and at altitudes of up to 16,000 feet (4,880 metres) in the Nepal Himalayas. Camels in the Gulf States have been known to chew paper laid as a trail-marker.

The idea for Hashing evolved from a game played at British Public Schools, which was adapted by a group of Britishers stationed in Malaya during the 1930s.

Although the group began earlier, the Hash House Harriers list 1938 as their official founding.

Frederick "Horse" Thomson, one of three surviving members of the original group, said the name was taken from an eatery in Kuala Lumpur popularly known as the "Hash House."

Thomson, a sturdy 79-year-old, recalled that Englishmen in Colonial Malaya used to play sports on Saturday and would have heavy meals on Sundays. Hash runs became popular activities following work on Monday as a way of working off the weekend's dissipation.

Socializing and a good time in part explain in part the rapid rise of Hashing. Many members are transient expatriates — businessmen, diplomats and contract workers — looking for camaraderie and a chance to let off steam in sometimes austere environments.

Preoccupation with fitness also has spurred the sport. But in contrast to participants in structured

amateur running events, Hash House Harriers regard competitiveness and all but the most minimal regimentation as distinctly bad form.

The British, Australians and New Zealanders have tended to dominate the sport in the past but Asians, Continental Europeans and Americans are taking part in greater numbers. There are more than 60 chapters in the United States, where Hashing began in 1972.

"Once you get hooked on Hashing, you'll start one when you move to a new place that doesn't have a Chapter. That's how we grow," said Milo Prodanovich, a US Navy chemist from California who attended the affair.

When Hashing got its start in San Diego, a few hashers were arrested for jaywalking by uninitiated policemen.

A run in Mexico was halted when authorities insisted the pack needed a permit "to stage a parade." But Prodanovich said Hashing since has spread unimpeded in Southern California.

Bans on alcohol and on women dressed in skin-exposing attire are problems in many Middle Eastern nations, hashers say. Runs are consequently staged in deserts and other remote areas.

Most communist countries frown on participation by their own nationals but pose few problems to the expatriates who have set up Chapters in China, Czechoslovakia, Laos, Poland, the Soviet Union, Vietnam and Yugoslavia.

The Moscow Hash, which has 150 members of 38 different nationalities, was banned from city streets but reportedly receives friendly, if incredulous, reactions from Muscovites in parks and wooded environs.

"The farmers down in Zhanjiang think we're crazy but I think they like us," said a hasher belonging to one of four Chapters in China. "We run through their villages and give them more entertainment than they get in a whole week." — AP

THE NATION POSTSCRIPT

What Denis D. Gray in his splendid summation of Hashing through the years and as we know it today, failed to dwell on was the intrinsic part played in the whole exercise, of imbibing copious draughts of what originally began as a frothy ale but today watered down to the more copious human intake of golden lager to the accompaniment of a chorus that goes 'Down, Down, Down.'


One cannot comprehend how some 2,500 hashers who converged on the seaside resort of Pattaya over the weekend 'Down-Down-Down' a mind-boggling quantity of 100,000 bottles of Singha 'Gold' that was the official brew between Friday and Monday.

That, statistically, is a record of sorts, as it means each hasher literally consumed 40 bottles per person, or something like 14 bottles a day on average. One can only believe that those who consumed far greater quantities during what was a sizzling hot Holy Week must have more than made up for those whose intake, and they included more than a few Harriettes, must have been considerably less. Still, this very fact will give Bali in 1988 more than a target to surpass when the next Inter-Hash is held there two years from now. — A.P.

THE STORY OF THE BIGGEST HASH CONVENTION EVER - PATTAYA, THAILAND - MARCH 1986



From all corners of the world Hashers converged on this quiet tropical coast resort. From the Falklands and Gambia, from Noosa and Maryland -- more than three thousand -- there must have been, how else do you clear a 50's articulated beer wagon and still have to send for more -- on the first night! A rumour quickly passed through the ranks that SINGHA GOLD created specially for INTERHASH, was smoother than the standard version and because of the lower "A" content was a knock out for not knocking you out. From the start this was Hash disorganisation gone wrong. Everything was perfect and a high standard for Bali to better in 1988.

For us it all started at Bahrain International Airport at 5.30am. A regrettable small mob of six - three B2H (Gordon, Dorelle and Malcolm) and three from BH3 (Stan, Ian and Don). A stopover in Bangkok for all of us before a coach convoy to Pattaya. We know of some who almost missed the convoy. Malcolm Clarke took to the night life and reported back, I don't know when, to Mum and Dad. Clearly there were a lot more than six Hashers in Bangkok now. It was a far Eastern Hash rave up par excellence! The more sensible had travelled to Pattaya the previous day, registered and got down to the serious business of enjoying the delights about having to get up early in the morning.

Stan who would find his own way to Pattaya owing to his not knowing what he would do to himself in Bangkok, finished up with the convoy. The reunions started at the pick-up point in the park. We who had done the Pattaya coach trip on previous occasions knew that there was beer on board and with the police escort in place we were ready to go. But wait why is that Hasher carrying a case of beer? Quick check the fridge "stop that man bring him board we need his company. Yes you guessed it, no beer. A successful kidnap was the mainstay for the next 90 minutes and new friendships were cemented ... it also helped get through the hairy ride.

There were 360 clubs or 362 including Gambia and Bahrain Black Hash. Registration was another reunion and the freebies were good too - light back pack, the usual T-shirt, a commemorative beach towel, (still in use), bottle opener with dog-tag, glass beer mug, umbrella hat, Hash rag, Pattaya belly capsules, soft tissue healing cream, (Dorrelle says it very good-should she know?), badges, stickers, etc etc. The meeting of new faces and old continued and many a toast drunk, drunk? not yet there was so much more to come.

The first ON ON started at dusk with an incredible array of food. Imagine the scene, a hotel with a patio on to the beach and the sun setting. So it was back into the coaches for an outdoor bonanza in a field big enough for 6000 complete with makeshift toilets (with paper), openair showers, fairy lights everywhere and about 30 BBQ stands. To top it all, an enormous stage where it was all to open. Jakarta came dressed in pink sarongs and T-shirts and carrying paper mache pigs. Their 4 person pig had been unsuccessful in clearing Thai customs, (a pity). Their song and disgusting act went down very well ... the pigs pissed at the audience, puked intestines and crapped on the stage. JH3 were, funny, sang well and looked good. The Vikings were equally well received for dress, act, songs and most of all for their stripping ! Cameras did not stop clicking. Jebel Hash were excellent with their Arabic costumes and tasteful act with a quick flash at the end. All cameras were poised next night for what they had missed first time round but alas the Jebel did not do a repeat performance ! Sydney Harriets did a lovely number in pink tu-tus whilst Wild Man of Borneo proved that an Arse is as good as a mouth for playing the harmonica to say nothing of a musical tool. Why are there so many skeptics? Some Hashes were hounded off with flying buns .. Stan's joke was not understood and he had to depart the stage. On and on it went until the early hours but it was not home to bed for some ... so many night spots on the way.

Next day, oh weary body, breakfast, sightseeing, siesta, what, another run ? Oh gees! choose your coach guys ... hey, why is everyone trying to go on the short trails ? All came back telling tales of snakes, elephants and in one case a bull tossing a Hasher and almost getting another. The runs were pretty well laid and on the whole, well appreciated. After toasts and down downs at each run site it was back to Hash HQ for a wash-up and mass ON ON. Horse Thompson, a founder member way back in 1937/38, was there. Typical "old school Englishman" with a twinkle in his eyes. He talked of hashes long ago and never ceases to be amazed at what the Hash has grown into, his only disappointment being that some Hashers do "seem to go over the top". The men's down down contest was won by an Aussie in xx seconds and then big Annie, (why is it that Aussies think they are the only ones who can drink ?), came on with a commendable 15.8 seconds ! Then on came a puny girl from Surrey. This Harriet did us proud, (Surrey folks that is), with a double down down in a staggering 21 seconds.



The end of an excellent weekend was drawing to a close and Tim Hughes had already retired exhausted. Joined by Norway, the Jebel and a smattering of others on the stage, Gordon led the close with the rendering. I can't call it singing, of the Hash Hymn. And so on to INTERHASH BALI 1988 No not quite. 450 of us stayed on to join the 50 strong Pattaya Hash on their regular Monday run. ON ON, food, drink, usual wankorous behaviour. I wish I could remember the name of their GM who was a most incredible Hash Mouth and has hollow legs for, for every down down anyone was given he got one afterwards and could still stand up. Down downs went to amongst others, Gordon and Dorelle for daring to have a wedding anniversary on a Hash night, to Cameron for being there and being another whose vocabulary extends to words beginning with W.C.R.F.N.J. and Z. to someone from Riyadh for revealing that Bahrain Hash House Harriers is no longer the biggest Hash in the world.

Going back to Bangkok some bemused Pakistan Hashers on the coach, when asked what they do down downs with in Karachi, replied 'water' to the dismay of all. They tucked in to the rum and coke offered by the Aussies but steered clear of the beer. We were to discover later that they were not Hashers after all and had boarded our coach by mistake. Oh well, all's well that ends well !

ON ON to INTERHASH BALI 1988

The more observant types among you may have noticed, that since April '86 a happy few of your fellow Yogya Hashers once in a while wear some funny tee-shirts. These appear to originate from a place called Pattaya, a seaside resort located near the city of Bang Cokk. On closer look also the word 'Interhash' can be discerned, which stands for the greatest opportunity you managed to miss (your grandchildren will still take it ill of you). Decide for yourself: too much beer, too few bottle openers, too many girls, too little sleep, too long runs, too many tee-shirts, and so on on. In shortcut: too much of everything and too little of the rest.

But let me start from the beginning. Towards the end of March, the happy few referred to above disappeared from the Yogya scene to re-emerge in Bangkok. Led by a mysterious collective instinct we gathered with a small army of other Hashers in the Pattpong district of that immense city, in order to check out the strange rumours about that place. These appeared to be true.

Satisfied with this result, the next day we boarded a Hashbus bound for Pattaya. Our bus happened to be stuffed with a remarkable blend of Copenhagen Hashers, Australians and numerous beercans, spiced with the finest selection of Chicago, Gulf, The Hague and Yogya Hashers. The spark to kindle this dangerous mix was provided in the form of Two-Lips From Holland. I cannot go into details here, so I confine myself to ascertain, that after three hours, on reaching our destination the party was loaded, hoarse, braless and bite-marked. (Those who are curious to learn the details can obtain these for a moderate fee from Hanker Henk or Yelling Yan)

In Pattaya, on the evening of the 28th of March, we joined about 2500 other 'delegates' from H3 clubs all over the world on the seafront terrace of the Grand Pallace Hotel for the introductory bash. While enjoying Thai beer, food, music and dancing, those present witnessed the entrance of Grand Master Tim Hughes on Thai elephant.

That evening the stream of bottles of Singha 'Gold' started to flow. It would continue until, after three days, a quantity of about 100,000 were 'down-downed', breaking all former records.

A nice Thai fireworks display at about 10 pm marked the end of this first gathering and gave the start shot for a mass checking of the course through the bars and gogo clubs of 'The Strip', as the famous nightlife section of Pattaya is appropriately called.

As the highly civilized average Yogya Hasher will not be much interested in this aspect of Interhash, I need not dwell on it any further. Suffice it to assure you that places like Super Star, BJ's, Caligula, Sabai Room, etc. were just numerous and boring enough to keep us busy checking until the wee hours of the morning. In particular, the meddling by some talented Hashers with the floorshows produced such boring scenes, that my pen refuses to describe them. (Again, you can approach me in private for a full account. Don't forget to bring a full crate)

After this lengthy introduction I come to the real thing, where we all had come for: the running. The first run took place on Saturday afternoon. One could choose among 17 different trails, varying from Short (about 1 hour!) to Long (up to 2 hours). More than 80 busses provided transport to and from the various run sites.

Like most Yogya Hashers, I chose one of the Medium runs. On one of these we had to swim across a creek! Those who could or did not want to do so, were forced to make an extra 'long cut' of about one km. Nice guys, those Hares! (Some - female - were pretty as well)

It is worth to mention, that half-way the runs a car with 'refreshments' awaited. Since the land was dessicated and the weather oppressively hot, these were quite welcome.

Also noteworthy seems the following observation. During the running, especially

at the harsher tracks, once in a while some mumbling could be overheard about certain numbers. For instance: 'Shit. That number 34...; my knees still fail.' The meaning of these cryptic words is unclear, though I suspect a relationship with the checking activities of the night before.

At the end of each run a short local 'down-down' was held, after which everybody proceeded to the Ocean Marina Club. Here, on a two hectare field, surrounded by food and piss distributing stalls, the giant communal On-On took place. This included, among others, the Down-Down World Championship. Needless to say that participants were mostly Aussies. Yet, to their dismay, a Kiwi called Mungo won the Trophy. He finished 2 litres of beer within 16 seconds, without spillage, which is 6 secs faster than the previous record. Another highlight was the introduction of 79 years old Frederick 'Horse' Thomson, who was among the founder members of the Mother Hash in Kuala Lumpur in 1938. Your reporter happened to come across him later during the weekend. Be sure I didn't wash my right hand for a week after.

At the On-On various Hashes and Hashers performed more or less successful stage acts, MC'ed by Frankie Benfield, an ex Jakarta Hasher. Worth mentioning are 'The Wild Man of Borneo' by the Brunei Hash, a 'Middle-eastern Girls' song with act by Gulf Hashers, the complicated exchange of a grammophone record by some Aussie Hashers, a song with large cue cards about a bloke who had lost his cock (Rhode Island breed), the Copenhagen Hash's competition with the local strip (see above), and the Jakarta Hash's piglet show.

Afterwards, the checking annex On-On-On in Pattaya was resumed (see above for no details).

On the bus ride back to Pattaya Henk had a sobering experience. After closing his eyes, the packed bus appeared to be empty, though it had not stopped. As he found out, everybody had climbed out of the windows upon the roof-rack, while the bus was travelling with a speed of 80 kms an hour.

The following Sunday the above cycle was repeated, and even on Monday a worn out remnant of 500 or so fanatics (incl. your reporter) staggered along a suitable short trail to the Alkazar Club terrace, where the Pattaya HHH hosted the last On-On.

The final 150 crates of beer were consumed here, while a certain 'Carrot' gave a record session of joke telling - unfortunately in an ear-twisting Aussie dialect - and Jakarta Hash lived up to their singing reputation.

In conclusion, I have to admit that Interhash '86 was a truly terrific event. In name of the Yogya Hash participants I express here our thanks to the IH Committees of Bangkok and Pattaya.

So: on on you lazy bastards, get your asses from the Yogya plain and don't miss your next opportunity in Bali in '88.



INTERHASH '86

28th-31st March - PATTAYA, THAILAND



Friday 28th March

REGISTRATION/BIG PISS-UP AT THE GRAND PALACE HOTEL

Registration was going on all day at the Grand Palace Hotel, a large luxurious hotel at the entrance to Pattaya. Hashers were coming and going or hanging around with beers in their hands, waiting for the great meeting at 6 o'clock that evening. With the registration, participants were given a backpack well equipped with all the necessities: a towel, an Interhash t-shirt, a beer mug, a copy of International Harrier magazine, a "refreshing, vitalising, caring" shower gel (compliments of Nivea), an antimycotin cream, diarrhoea pills (obviously aware of what sort of food was going to be served later on!), a sun/rain umbrella hat and a bottle opener. Besides all that, extra t-shirts from individual clubs and other bits and pieces were on sale around the area. Noticeably good was a great selection of t-shirts printed by the Thai Family Planning organisation, featuring the use and promotion of condoms!

At 6 o'clock almost every Hasher was there, representing something like 590 clubs from about 65 countries and all continents, including Antarctica - nearly 3,000 people if the late and on-the-spot registrations are taken into account. Very prominent were the Aussies - close to half the participants. At about 8.00pm all five Kuwait Hashers (GM Jan, Alan, Jim, HF Peter and myself) managed to meet each other, despite the pandemonium. The Gold Singha Beer (official Interhash beer) was arriving by the crate-load, food was served, and everyone was involved in t-shirt swapping, shorts swapping and ass grabbing, introducing themselves with hearty hugs and, at the same time, getting more and more pissed. Some entertainment was offered on a stage: some Thai folk dancing with traditional costumes (that was the only time I glanced towards the stage) - I didn't pay much attention and neither did the majority of Hashers present. The inauguration ceremony ended with multicoloured fireworks and a sparkling Interhash '86 sign, some speech by the organisers which I don't remember, and a few songs (or was it many?), which again I don't remember, for obvious reasons. After that, the Hashers hit the Night Clubs, Bars, and Discos, abundant in Pattaya which is very successfully competing with Bangkok as a "fun city".

Saturday 29th March

FIRST RUNS

Meeting place was the same hotel at 2 o'clock, and eighty buses were waiting to take us on the runs. This certainly allowed enough time for the participants to pull themselves together and recover from the night before, either by sleeping all morning or having a few beers beforehand to cure the hangover. But 2.00pm was the hottest part of the day, and it got even worse by 3 o'clock - the time at which the buses actually left for the run sites. There were 16 trails laid altogether: 7 short ones, 6 medium ones, and 3 long ones. Alan seemed fit and bright (he's never seemed "bright"! - Hash Scribe) and chose a long one, Jan went for a medium trail, Jim I didn't see, and Peter and myself also chose a medium one (after a lot of hesitation). Peter appeared wearing the red and yellow umbrella/hat, being the only one out of 3,000 runners appearing with the silly thing on his head. And, as if this wasn't

enough, while we were waiting for the buses to leave, he proceeded to try on skirts, shorts and tops a woman was selling on the street. I strongly advised him to get a long black skirt with large bright-coloured flowers and slits on the side to match his umbrella hat, but instead he bought a pair of shorts with some exotic palm tree design, which wasn't a bad choice after all, and only double the normal price.

The start for the run I chose (No. 16) was by a picturesque temple and, after some words from our Thai hares, which weren't very clear, we set off. We were following paper, the checks were crosses, and the false trails circles. Since the hares didn't run with us to lead the way the pack got onto the wrong trail after the first check. Myself and a few "dedicated" runners were walking along admiring the scenery and the palm trees, occasionally looking for paper already blown away by the wind, when the no. 2 run pack came up from behind and informed us that we were following the wrong trail. With much relief we turned back to the buses and attacked the beer truck and nobody could blame us for not running! The rest of the "show off" runners ended up at the no. 2 run start, were not offered any beer, and had to turn back. Even so, it was an easy run for them - certainly not the length of the proper trail - and everyone survived the 35+ heat and the 90+ humidity. Actually, after a few beers all hashers present were in excellent spirits. We were a rather small group, which made it easy to get to know each other, and there was plenty of beer to go around - down the throat or over the head. There was a lot of singing and a lot of down-downs going on, led by the loudest present (which included HF Peter).

The giant ON-ON was held in a large open area in Ocean Marina, where sooner or later, everyone arrived, hot and sweaty from the runs and singing and gulping down of Gold Singhas with incredible speed started. Reports on the lengths of the various trails were that they were generally long - longer than expected, anyway. Barbeques were set up and a selection of meats, salads and vegs was offered. Soft drinks and water were occasionally seen. A big stage was set up and soon after dark the festivities first started with DIOs for the Hares. Unfortunately the loudspeaker system was quite fucked up and the announcements and singing were muffled and not quite understood - at least not by me, situated quite far away. The World Down-Down Championship took place with tankards that held six beer bottles - about 2 litres of beer! The winner downed that in about 16 seconds! One Hasher removed all his clothes for the competition, but that didn't seem to help his speed. After the DIOs the shows started - some quite good, some poor. They were mainly featuring some song accompanied by an often unsteady and uncoordinated dancing, stripping, mooning, etc. The Jakarta Hashers and the Sydney Harriettes stand out as being worth mentioning.

At about 10 o'clock the buses took us back to Pattaya, where the majority of hashers headed for the bars again. Two of the hares owned bars - B.J.s and the Wild Elephant - and they were the obvious places to stop at some time during the night. However, several other bars, well aware of a Hasher's thirst, had put up signs inviting us in. In fact every single bar and disco in Pattaya was invaded by the 3,000 or so Hashers, who more or less took the place over for those two nights.

Sunday, 30th March

SECOND RUNS

Early morning hours found all five of us at various bars and clubs, trying to stand on two feet and keep the bottles steady. We kept seeing each other at various bars or in the streets, having a great time. HF Peter was the first to disappear from the scene, still wearing the damn umbrella on his head, with bleary eyes looking quite under the weather. Jim was the next to disappear - with a beautiful companion (although nasty rumours say that he actually hit the pillow and slept soundly until late morning!). I met Jan and Alan at B.J.'s Bar (which I made my last stop because it was near my hotel), and we honourably kept the Hash spirit and beer drinking well into the morning hours.



I woke up around noon, only to realize I had missed the Secretaries' Meeting. At another meeting, also held that morning, the selection of the venue for the next Interhash, to be held in 1988, took place. Bali (Indonesia) won, with San Diego (USA) coming second.

Again Hashers joined up at the Grand Palace Hotel for the runs at the same damned hour of 2 o'clock - most looked rather weary, definitely worse than the day before. I decided to take the run generally considered to be the shortest, if the stories I'd heard the night before were to be believed - suffering from severe hangover and dehydration, it seemed to be the obvious choice. In fact, it was the choice of a large number of Hashers so that the buses for "run no. 8" were crowded like sardine tins. Peter came along on the same run (not with the umbrella this time, but with the new fancy shorts). I've never seen such a worn-out, run-down, blood-shot eyed group of runners in my life. The run actually started as a walk, and continued to be a walk for a large number of us, although a few attempted a bit of running, motivated by the offer of free t-shirts for the first 120, and, of course, the cold beer. The drinks and beer disappeared very quickly, due to the large number of Hashers present, so that by the time I got back most of it was gone (Yes, it took me a while to walk through - but I wasn't the last one either!) and I only managed to grab two beers. One of the original founders of the Hash in Kuala Lumpur was attending the Interhash and he was with us that day - 70+ years old and he looked very fit for his age (note that hashing and beer drinking are definitely healthy!)

Due to the lack of beer, the On-In activities were quiet and short. Soon we left for the Giant On-On - the real piss-up and fun time. There were obviously less people hanging on for the afterhash activities this second day and, as a result, it was easier to get close to the stage and enjoy the shows. I suppose that some Hashers just couldn't put up with the pace, or couldn't adapt to the heat, and so a few buses left early. Now, what I remember of this night's shows is not very impressive (but better than the previous night) although I was near the stage - due to the continuous interruptions of going back behind the bushes and looking for more beer, losing concentration on various other shows (intended or not) that were going on around me. Believe me, there were some crazy things going on!



The Copenhagen HHH did a Viking show, eventually stripping off their robes to show men with brassiers, black stockings and no panties, and topless girls with huge dildos - and most of these items were also taken off and thrown to the crowd. Baghdad HHH also had a good show, featuring a song Hag Anybody Seen My Cock? Dar-es-salaam (Tanzania) had a rather poor (clean) singing show. One guy did a mooning, featuring a nicely painted face on his ass and playing harmonica with his dick. Another one

blew a condom over his head, and another did the same thing with a huge plastic glove. At the end of these shows, we once again hit the bars of Pattaya until the early morning hours.

Monday. 31st March


PATTAYA HHH RUN

POSTSCRIPT

I finish this very vague (and possibly inaccurate!) write-up of Interhash with apologies for the short memory (Long live Gold Singha beer) and a strong recommendation: DON'T MISS THE NEXT INTERHASH! It is worth every penny and every minute spent!

28.3.86

Arrived at Changi Airport 7:00 A.M. and already scenes of chaos and disorganization — typical of the Hash. She was lucky to get on the bus in one piece. After several counts of passengers on board the bus we were on the way to Pattaya. Soon a beer stop was called for and at




Airport Frolics

Arrived at the Official Opening on back of motorbike (Courtesy of Bruce Hawley). Never seen so many hashers before — about 2,500. The buffet-style dinner was welcome but for me the main attraction was continually meeting hashers I knew from other hashes. It was great seeing familiar faces from Manila, Hong Kong, Bangkok, Sydney, Surabaya, Bicester and even Banjul, The Gambia. Interhash T/Shirts of all descriptions were being worn — one of the best read "I thought Pat Tyre was an Irishman until I discovered Interhash '86" from Little Sai Wan H3 Hong Kong. After the food came the Official Opening with Interhash GM Tim Hughes being deposited on stage by an elephant. Incidentally the elephant qualified for the all time hash shit award. Apparently, before depositing the GM on stage it deposited something else earlier and there were hashers running in all directions trying to escape the roar of thunder and avoid getting drenched. Show time followed with Thai Dancing, Thailand's premier rock band Lam Morrison who played well but were about 15 years out of date and some performers from Alcazar Cabaret.

11:00 P.M. and it was On On to check out the action on the strip. The ladies (wives that is) were in charge and so their choice of bars was as follows:

First stop was the Caligula Club where the girls displayed their versatility with ping pong balls, cigarettes, razor blades and of course hashers. On entering the bar, we saw an anonymous Aussie hasher from Cairns or one of those obscure places who was performing along with the girls. However hard the girl tried she couldn't raise any excitement from Mr. Limp. Most disgusting down down award went to a group of Balikpapan Hashers. This consisted of a pussy doing a down down, followed by three hashers lying on the floor and drinking straight from the horse's mouth so to speak. Next stop was a Gay Bar and show. At 2:00 A.M. on Saturday morning it was on home to the hotel past hun-

dreds of bars with hashers in every one. Apparently at 5:00 A.M. it was still going strong according to Rochelle and we also heard reports of dazed hashers walking along the beach around 7:00 A.M. I doubt if they managed Saturday's run.

29.3.86

At last we come to the first of the two Interhash runs. There were a total of 16 runs, some long, some medium and some short. And also short runs which turned out to be long runs and long runs which turned out to be short runs. We picked short run #6 and left in a convoy of three buses. On arriving at the run site, the Hares asked for all the GMs present to come forward. Each one was given a down down from bed pans! There were about 15 GMs present and only one Grand Mistress — well done Mary for doing the down down before the run! At 3:15 we were off and expecting a run of about an hour and a quarter which in fact turned out to be two hours. The trails itself was very good; however it was extremely hot and the beer and soft drinks stop along the way was most welcome. Our buses were also there and about 90% of the pack decided that was it and we all climbed back on the bus and left just a few people running. About 30 minutes later we joined the rest of the pack and most of us decided to run the rest of the trail back to the On On site. The final run in or walk in was along the beach — about 15-20 minutes. Far too long for a supposedly short run. Back at the On On we were able to compare runs with the other groups and found some runs were better organized than others, some lost their buses, but found buses from another group, others didn't have any water stops and a lot of people complained about the heat. It was now time for the gaint ON ON which I guess was just about the biggest ever in the history of the hash. The food was not very good — some one said it would have been better at McDonalds. However there was plenty of beer which came from the worlds biggest Eskie — a Maersk Line Container. At 7:30 it was show time. But first Interhash GM Tim Hughes welcomed one of the founding members of the hash, Horse Thomson who said a few words and was visibly moved by the whole occasion. It was now time for the individual hashes to put on their own acts, some were outstanding, some were not and some were terrible. Two of the best acts came from the Jakarta Hash who sang about stuffing pigs and managed to shower the audience with all sorts of rubbish, and the Copenhagen Hash who started out dressed as Vikings and ended with almost no clothes at all. They got such a good reception that they were asked to come back and repeat their act the following evening. Next came the Down Down contest which went on far too long. There were over 20 hashers attempting to drink a total of eight bottles of beer from a huge mug. The contest went on far so long that we left before it finished. And so it was On On again to the strip. And this time I'm not going to bore you with all the details because I can't remember except that this time we went back to the hotel at 4:00 A.M.



Fed, watered and consumed by mosquitos, the nine Desert Hashers returned to the Hotel for the final night fling. 5TH INTER-HASH 1986 IN PATTAYA BEACH THAILAND (28-30.3.86)

After trying with no luck to convince several members of the hashing community in Semarang to join me to participate in the 5th Inter-Hash in Pattaya Beach, Thailand, I decided to join the Jakarta H3 touring party of about 40 hashers (and harriettes) to Thailand.

I won't bore you with the mundane description of the travel to Thailand. Apart from to tell you that the "hardcore" of the JH3 party got thoroughly "pissed", and some tore up all newspapers which they could find on board the Airbus in order to set a "trail" between Singapore and Bangkok!

The headquarter for the 5th Inter-Hash the Grand Palace Hotel in Pattaya, which is a very large hotel and convention centre, situated on a nice looking beach.

The official registration took place in the afternoon, and we were all given a ruck-sack full of "give-ways", eg. 2 T-shirts, hats, beach towel, glass, beer opener (very essential since all drinks were bottled!) etc. etc. It was reported that about 2800 hashers had registered for the event and at least 2500 were actually participating.

In the evening of the 28th March 1986 was the official opening of 1986 Inter-Hash. The dress for this event, as for all other events, was HHH Club T-shirts and it was therefore an excellent opportunity to swap T-shirts with "delegates" from other H3 clubs!

A magnificent fireworks display took place about 10 pm and that set us off sparkling to check out the action in the strip in South Pattaya distinct where all the bars, night clubs and the Go-Go clubs are located. The night life in Pattaya was for the next 2 - 3 days completely dominated by hashers, which were found everywhere until dawn.

The first run took place on Saturday Afternoon, and there were 17 different runs set out for the participants! The system with runs was as follows : There were short, medium and long runs, and you could choose yourself what type of run you wanted to go on.

Short runs : Run No. 1 - 6 (about 1 hour)
Medium runs : Run No. 7 - 12 (about 1 - 1,5 hour)
Long runs : Run No. 13 - 17 (about 1,5 - 2 hour)

As soon as you had decided which type of run you wanted to do, you just looked on a big board to find out where the buses were parked for that particular run. Then you just entered the bus taking you to the run you wanted.

About 80 buses were provided to bring the hashers to and from the various runs. The plan was that on the following day, the participants selected a different run.

The runs were either loops, or from point A to B. The participants were taken to the start and picked up with the usual refreshment on hand for those who made it to the finishing line. All runs were set out within a 25 - km radius of Pattaya.

My first Inter-Hash run was a good run, which took just under one hour. There were about 100 hashers participating, of which the majority were from Jakarta H3, Dubai H3 and Medan H3. The terrain was flat, very dry and it reminded me very much about hash runs in Bahrain. The checks were good and they really got the hash together. The hares did not go on the run but they stayed behind at the buses to look after the beer and all our belongings.

The Jakarta hash decided to arrange a proper ON-ON at the end of the run before we boarded the buses to be transported to a communal ON-ON for all the 17 runs, ie. for 2500 hashers!

After an hour of "down-downs", we proceeded to the Ocean Marina Club, where the giant ON-ON began around sun-set. Food and drinks galore, all supplied by the organizers. In the evening, a "potpourri" of International HHH cabaret acts and entertainment were presented, and the Copenhagen "Walkin' Vikings" made a tremendous impression!

The Grand Master of Inter-Hash '86 introduced during the evening, Mr. Frederick "Horse" Thomson, who was one of the founder members of the first hash house harriers club in Kuala Lumpur during 1938. He has become a real celebrity in the hashing world, and he was also the Guest of Honour at the 4th Inter-Hash in Sydney, Australia.

Back, to the giant ON-ON! The world "Down-down" championship was also arranged during the evening, and of course one of the hashers from down-under (New Zealand) won the trophy, which shall not be described here! (You can ask me about it in private later!)

The ON-ON closed about 10.30 pm. and the majority continued their drinking habits down-town Pattaya.





If you thought last week's run was big (102 starters) then this one must have sat you down. The 577 Hashers came from 151 Clubs in 38 countries. The big Hashmen invasion of Pattaya

SAWATDEE is the Thai word for welcome. And never was there a bigger, louder Sawatdee for the 3,000 wild-eyed bellicose pseudo-athletes who ran amok through the streets of Pattaya at the end of last month.

More than 3,000 Harriers and Harriettes representing some 590 Hash House Clubs in 92 countries converged to Southeast Asia's most famous beach resort sporting bizarre pieces of cloth which they called T-shirts and shorts to run, to eat, to drink and have a bloody good time.

Never mind if it's burning hot outside, too bad if it rains, just make sure there's enough of dirt country for Hash House Harriers to charge through and, God willing, a little of that bubbly yellow liquid which makes monsters out of men and it's ON ON.

Interhash meets are held once every two years, the first being in Hong Kong in 1978, the others in Kuala Lumpur, Jakarta and Sydney.

The fifth Interhash which ended in Pattaya just last month was claimed to be the largest and most cosmopolitan "sporting event" ever in Thailand, that is, the most participants, if not spectators.

The Asian countries supplied the largest contingent of nearly 1,000 Harriers and Harriettes. Malaysians came by the hordes from more than 50 HHH clubs both in the peninsula and the east.

Australia and New Zealand also came strong in numbers while the Asian cities of Karachi, New Delhi, Manila, Singapore, Jakarta, Seoul, Hong Kong and Bangkok were well represented.

The rest were from such distant shores as the Dominican Republic, Peru, Salvador, Costa Rica, Papua New Guinea, Yemen, Mauritania, Spain, Iraq, Honduras, Guatemala, Botswana, Greece, Denmark, not to mention the USSR and China.

Proceedings began with a grand reception on March 28 at the Grand Palace Hotel in Pattaya. The massive crowd was welcomed by Tim Hughes of Bangkok HHH, the honourable disorganising chairman of Interhash '86. Tim entered the bash appropriately on the gentle beast that graces the official logo of the fifth Interhash — the elephant.

☆☆☆☆☆
The runs were set under a scorching sun at 16 locations within a 25km radius of Pattaya. There were seven short runs of an hour's duration, five medium and three "toughies" of nearly two hours. However, some Harriers claimed that they were all the same length — long.

More than 80 buses were arranged to transport the Harriers and Harriettes to the ON ONs (runs) and later to the DOWN DOWNs (refreshments, hic!) and HASH HYMNS (lyrics to make a sailor blush).

Whilst the very hot and dry weather was far from ideal and the running terrain a trifle uninspiring, Pattaya's friendly, relaxed atmosphere made the Hash pilgrim-

mage a fabulous experience.

Who can forget the scores of banners of welcome bedecking the streets of Pattaya — some charmingly misspelt and others humorously insulting (Welcome UK Hashwankers! read one), not to mention the ubiquitous girlish cries of ON ONs which greeted Harriers passing through the famous Pattaya "strip" and acknowledgement in 92 different accents?

Happiness was meeting old Hashmates from earlier Interhashes and former runners of your own club, now banished overseas. Seremban runners met up with old SH3 members Gwyn and Jenny Davis who made the pilgrimage from Guyana. Aini and Chris Bell from Madrid and the Cruickshank family from Melbourne.

Commented Martin Bastock, an engineer working for the United Nations: "I've never experienced anything like this before. The camera-


derie and sincerity with which you are received and invited to run is incredible." Martin first heard about Hashing while, coincidentally, holidaying in Pattaya and subsequently registered for the runs.

Most Malaysians still do not know that Hash House Harriers (HHHs) as a running club began in Kuala Lumpur nearly 90 years ago. Hash House was the name given for its institution food to the Selangor Club Chambers where resided a number of bachelors and others separated from their wives (long separations being an inevitable facet of colonial life at that time) though the idea of Harriers chasing paper was not new to Malaysia as such clubs existed in KL, Johore Baru, Ipoh and Malacca in the 1930s.

However, it was not until 1938 when it was organised as a new show with a completely novel name. Principal dramatic personae were A.S. Gispert ("G"), Cecil Lee, Frederick "Horse" Thom-

son, "Torch" Bennet and Philip Wickens. Gisbert who moved to KL in 1938 is given credit for being the one who actually got it off the ground.

The first runs incidentally, were on Fridays and not Mondays, as Monday was parade night for the Selangor Volunteers to which many members belonged.

Sadly Gisbert had only a short time with his extraordinary creation, being killed in the fighting in Singapore in 1942. With the exception of Philip Wickens, who died in London in April 1981, the others are still very much in contact with the KL HHHs.

☆☆☆☆☆
Of the founders, only "Horse" Thomas, rugged and robust at 79, attended the Pattaya Interhash and the previous one in Sydney. He commented: "I am simply astonished and flabbergasted with the phenomenal growth of HHH clubs and have never had my picture taken so many times, or shaken so many hands as during Interhash meets."

What is Hashing? Harriers regard competitiveness and regimentation as bad for health and in contrast to their counterparts in amateur sports, they ask for no prizes and receive no training. The HHHs have been described as runners who drink or drinkers who run or the Hooligans Rotary.

In Hashing, runners or "hounds" (they are now more popularly known as Harriers and Harriettes) try to follow a tricky trail laid by a "Hare". The trail ends abruptly at several intervals called "checks" and resume within a ra-

dus of 50 metres. The PROP (Front Runner On Paper) shouts "checking" and spread out to locate the start of the next trail-stage which is marked by paper, chalk, flour or ink, depending on weather conditions.

When it is found, the cry ON ON mobilises the runners. It is a cooperative rather than a competitive run and therein lies its unique attraction. A well-set run will keep the whole pack — fast and slow runners alike — together.

The HHHs run through steamy Asian jungles, mine fields in the Falkland Islands, at altitudes of almost 5,000 metres in the Himalayas with Nepal HHH, the desert sands of the Gulf States and there has even been one run in Antarctica but a blizzard blew the paper away.

The fitness boom has put the sport in high gear. The comradeship and camp-fire atmosphere are part of the Hashing movement. Many members are expatriates looking for friends and an avenue for unbridled fun.

Hashing internationally, when Hashing started in San Diego recently, a few Harriers were arrested for jaywalking.

Mexican authorities put a stop to one run and insisted that the pack needed a permit "to stage a parade".

In the Middle East, prohibitions on women dressed in sports attire have resulted in runs staged in deserts.

☆☆☆☆☆
Most communist countries do not encourage their own nationals to participate but have cautiously ignored expatriates who have set up chapters in China, Czechoslovakia, Laos, Poland, USSR, Vietnam and Yugoslavia. The Moscow HHH club which has 150 members from 35 different countries was banned from city streets but still receives bewildered stares from Muscovites in Gorky Park.

"Perhaps we'll never get over the self-consciousness of shouting 'Check' when we are face to face with a Czech," mentioned a member of Prague HHH club from Czechoslovakia.

Hashing has really come a long way and is expected to spread at a phenomenal pace in the next few years.

The first attempt at an Interhash get-together was the Kuala Lumpur 1,000th post-war run in 1966. A spectacular, the 1,500th in 1973 when the attendance was something over 300. Malaysian national celebration meets attract more than 300 Hashmen, the most recent being the Seremban 1,000th which brought together an estimated 662 souls. Interhash 1978 in Hong Kong attracted more.

Interhash 1980 in Kuala Lumpur was credited with an attendance of 1,242 and Interhash 1981 in Jakarta welcomed 1,136. The Sydney event in 1984 attracted 1,562 participants, and Pattaya, well the figure 3,000 explains it all.






