After Trinidad was cancelled The Interhash Council released this message (March 28, 2022)

Fellow hashers,

As you all know after four years of hard work, the Trinidad and Tobago Interhash Committee were unable to host Interhash in May 2022. The cancellation was necessary due to local COVID-19 restrictions in place at that time which limited large public gatherings. This meant that they would not have been able to host Interhash in the traditional way.

The Goa Interhash Committee, who put together an excellent bid to host Interhash in 2024, have offered to host Interhash in Goa from 4 to 6 November 2022. The Interhash Council graciously accepts Goa's commitment to Interhash and will do whatever it takes to assist them in moving forward with their decision. The Council feels that holding an Interhash this year is preferable to having a six-year gap between Interhash events. You can find out more about the Goa Interhash, including how to register at www.interhashgoa2022.com (available later this week) or on the Goa Interhash Facebook Page.

New Zealand will host the 2024 Interhash in Queenstown in February. The New Zealand bid was the only other bid for 2024 which passed the criteria to host.

I imagine you have heard by now that the Trinidad & Tobago Interhash has been canceled. At the time of the cancellation Covid-19 protocols meant that Interhash would not have been able to be held in the traditional manner. Goa has been selected to host Interhash from 4 to 6 November 2022. New Zealand will host Interhash in 2024.

This rapidly evolving situation has raised some confusion and generated a number of conspiracy theories. With the past history of shenanigans surrounding Interhash selection, poor execution, and outright theft of Interhash funds, I can understand how hash suspicions have been raised. I want to lay out what actually happened to address these suspicions.

As you know, the Interhash Council was formed in 2018 to oversee Interhash bids to assure that they were well thought out and provided Hashers the best value for money. (Prior to 2018 an informal elders council would meet to discuss the direction of Interhash and offer informal advice to bidders and hosts). The Council also supervises elections, so they are fair and transparent, and provide advice to the

elections, so they are fair and transparent, and provide advice to the winning bidder when asked. Prior to the cancellation of Interhash T&T, the Council reviewed three potential bidders for Interhash in 2024: - Goa, New Zealand, and Turkey. The Council found the Goa and New Zealand bids were well thought out with good support and experience of hosting major events. The Turkey bid was found to be incomplete with no sponsors, government support and limited Turkish kennel support. The Council informed the Turkey bidders of the problems inherent in their bid and encouraged them to continue

Fellow Hashers,

I imagine you have heard by now that the Trinidad & Tobago Interhash has been cancelled. At the time of the cancellation COVID-19 protocols meant that Interhash would not have been able to be held in the traditional manner. Goa has been selected to host Interhash from 4 to 6 November 2022. New Zealand will host Interhash in 2024.

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As this was unfolding, the Council negotiated with T&T to assure that any surplus funds remaining after the formal audit was completed would go to the next winning bidder. The T&T Interhash committee noted that the audit was not likely to be completed until early autumn. We informed Goa management team of this potential timing problem. They decided to move forward with Interhash

without the surplus funding. Subsequently the Council agreed to pass on the surplus, if any, to the New Zealand bid team.

I have been asked by some hashing mates 'what about Turkey'? What if they deliver a complete plan to host Interhash in 2024? After substantial debate the Council decided to stick with New Zealand. This was our reasoning. We have asked all potential bidders to present their bids six months before interhash so the Council could carefully review the bids, get back with comments and questions to the bidders, and for the bidders to revise their bids as needed. In this case, we were flexible given the pandemic and shortened the drop-dead submission time to three months. The Turkish mis-management team missed both the six and three months cut off dates and delivered an incomplete proposal only two months before the T&T Interhash was to kick off. With this questionable performance (understandable given that the Turkish GM contacted COVID during this period), the Council was left with only one acceptable bid to consider for 2024. If Turkey does submit an acceptable bid in the future they will be considered with other bids to host the 2026 Interhash.

Hopefully the Interhash Committee are already looking into the T&T finances, which IMHO is the exact reason why a central council of experienced hashing organisers is needed! The days of Interhash money 'evaporating' need to come to an end immediately.


Hong Kong

March saw two big events, starting with *Hopeless's* 3500th ever hash run on March 1st, St. David's Day, an event celebrated with the Ladies' Hash. Following that, in the same week, *Extra Testicle* marked 40 years running with RS2H3, funding his own stash! HK's oldest hash, H4, held their AGPU with local boy *Eric Chan* assuming the top role as GM. With COVID restrictions biting, hashing was operating "under the radar" - not least due to US\$1,300 fine for not wearing a mask, even when on trail/exercising. Current rules are in force until April 20th when it is hoped Hong Kong will start to open up to some kind of normality and some of the suspended chapters can start hashing again.

England

Hasher and Ultra marathon man David Hellard was racing in a six-day ultra marathon across the Sahara Desert when he came up with the idea for Caffeine Bullet energy chews. This creation has led to him being featured on the latest series of BBC One's Dragons' Den, where budding entrepreneurs get three minutes to pitch their business idea to a panel of multimillionaires. The Bullets are already sold online and in select sports shops. "We're really well known in the running industry but now we want to become more of a mainstream brand," David says. The entrepreneur took up running at age 27 after joining the London Hash House Harriers, 'an international non-competitive running, social and drinking club. I'd just broken up with my then girlfriend, I'd started to get man boobs and suddenly I had all this free time," he recalls. "The Hash House Harriers are the biggest running club in the world. I joined them and that just transformed everything. I fell in love with the joy of running. It wasn't about training or times, it was using running to explore," he continues. "Someone lays a trail so you never know where it's going to go. You turn up at a different pub in zone 1 or 2, and you explore all the nooks and crannies and back streets of London. There's no better way to see a part of a city."

Haldon H3 made the local newspapers with the celebration of their 1220th Hash. Rather than meeting at a bar they upgraded to one of the better known restaurants in the town centre. On On Haldon!

Russian Embassy Protests

HHHi Shakes,

Thanks for another good issue.

I liked the photo of the Russian Embassy protest. I was there and I could almost recognise some of the hashers in the photo through the pixelated blur.

To be honest, I don't remember much about the event. It was organised by London H3 and Hooray Henry could well have been the ringleader. A few of us from the Haunch of Venison Mountain Rescue Club H3 took the train over from Salisbury in support. I believe the trail was mostly in Hyde Park. When the memory is bad, the documentation has to be good, and having read through my HOVMRCH3 hash sheets from 1984 I can confirm that the run/ demo took place on 5th October 1984. The sheet for HOV run 32 (3/10/84) said "It was announced at the 300th Run weekend for the Wessex H3 that the London H3 are organizing a Hash in London this Friday evening at 6.30pm. All Hashers are welcome. You must wear an HOVT shirt. Oh yes, the start of the run is as close to the Russian Embassy as we are allowed to get. ON ON! and up Yours, comrade!"

The sheet from Run 26 (see right) included a copy of an article from the Daily Telegraph from 22nd August 1984. The article describes an incident where a Moscow hasher was detained by the police and was released after half an hour's questioning. It ends by saying that embassies, who had understood that hashing was permitted, were seeking clarification from the authorities.

My understanding is that, as a result of the "clarification", **Moscow H3** became restricted to setting their trails within the boundaries of Gorky Park, "a suitable place for exercise", and were banned from running on the streets. MH3 were naturally unhappy about this and when the word got to London the UK hashers decided to declare their solidarity with them through a protest hash.

Transcript of Daily Telegraph article:

Moscow police have clumsily chosen the week of the Soviet bloc' "84' Friendship Games to crack down on a group of joggers from western embassies called The Hash house Harriers.

Based on an idea which begun in Malay before the war, the Moscow Hash is one of about 250 "chapters" in 50 countries. It started weekly runs, hare and hounds style a year ago.

On Monday evening 75 runners were following a trail laid by a West German diplomat through central Moscow when police grabbed one of them - a western businessman who prefers not to be identified. A burly police colonel accused him of 'breaching Moscow's special ordinances'.

Several plain clothes and unformed police arrived promptly and asked for the hash leaders papers. As they were clad only in running gear, they had to fetch the documents from their embassies. They explained to the police the history of hashing and mentioned that a Soviet diplomat is reputed to run with the Peking chapter.

After half an hour or so the businessman, with his nine-year-old son, was allowed to run on his way. Embassies which thought they had official clearance for the weekly outing, are now seeking clarification.

Swing Low

Audry

I noticed the piece about "Swing Low", with the letter from *Crusader* pointing out that, because of the associations of the song with English rugby, no Welshman would sing it. I can add to his letter, confirming Scottish hashes don't sing it either (that includes Simmer Dim before *Shetland H3* formally started, and the 'Caledonian Hash' joint organisers of 2019 UK Nash Hash)

As to the song itself, I first learned the words when I was in the Glasgow University Air Squadron from 1984 - 88, with the actions, obviously. For the second verse, "Jordan" was accompanied by heading an imaginary football, as it was based on Scottish footballer Joe Jordan, rather than the contemporaneous Michael Jordan. Given Jordan had stopped international football with the Scotland team in 1982 (though was still playing club football in England and later Italy during the mid 80s), this suggests that the song and actions, at least in the UK, date from the late 1970s when Jordan's career was at its height.

As to why the Air Squadron sang it (along with others such as the Chicago Department Store), I have no idea of the origins, although it is likely that some of the members may have picked it up from playing rugby at school - when I joined the Squadron, it was already assumed to be a "known song" and hence passed down the membership, rather than "Here's a good one I heard", and being introduced during my time there.

While that doesn't refute any of what you have written, it might help to add to the "It wasn't originated by rugby fans" though the date does get shunted back from the 1987 "confirmed".

Hashing in the Caucasus

As the hashing world slowly emerges from the ongoing COVID situation, it will soon be time to once again fully put on our hash traveling shoes and re-capture the wonders of the globe taking in the sights, sounds and the revelry/comradery of the worldwide hash. One such destination which all should put on their hash bucket list is the Caucasus region, a region I had the good fortune of working in and hashing in during the pre-COVID period. In addition to the natural beauty of the region and the great people, food and yes beer, both Georgia and Azerbaijan are blessed with excellent hashes, great trails and long traditions of hashing note. With the assistance of Crash Test Dummy (CTD) aka Stuart Adair of the Tbilisi Hash House Harriers (TH3) and Down Under Ware (DUW) aka Kylie Shields of the Baku Hash House Harriers (BH3), I was able to both use my own understanding of the region as well as their much vaster knowledge of hashing in the Caucasus to piece together some of their Hash history and some memorable moments for these two Caucasus hashes. As for Armenia and the Yerevan Hash House Harriers (YH3), I will have to defer to them to fill in the hashing world as I have not had the good fortune to hash there yet or to be well enough acquainted with those that do. Given that the Caucasus Hashes remain active chapters to this day, it is without a doubt that once travel regulations ease up I myself will one day again soon (hopefully) revisit this great region of the Caucasus to once again partake of their beautiful trails, great beer and wine and hashing fun. I highly suggest that one and all should do the same and you will never forget the Caucases when/ if you do so. A little Tbilisi Hash House Harriers history by Crash Test Dummy:

The Tbilisi Hash House Harriers (TH3) started from 1997 onwards under the able stewardship of Willie Nelson, Lady Frankenstein, Chris Lane and Carlton but the hash really came into its own and garnered a wide following under the leadership of World Wanker, who is sadly not with the Hashing world anymore. Despite the fact that due to the po-

litical situation at the time most embassies in Tbilisi were advising against travel out of Tbilisi, the hash still gradually gained ground with a mix of expats and locals. World Wanker's sterling organisational efforts and the promise of "All downhill trails" saw a regular turnout of 30 hashers per hash trail. After several revolutions and the sacking of most of the police force in 2007, travel in the city and beyond became easier. Lady Frankenstein was one of the early GM's in 2000 and again in 2011 (Mother Hash-Banda Aceh Hash, Sumatra 1982) and We Are Hazy On was the first RA. Up through the period leading to the recent COVID years the TH3 GM was Fisher of Men (Mother Hash - Tbilisi, 2010 and for the last nearly ten years the TH3 RA has been Crash Test Dummy (Mother Hash - Baghdad 1986).

The Tbilisi Hash was the instigator of the Inter-Caucasus Hash affectionately known as the Inter-cock whose aim was to bring together hashers from Azerbaijan, Armenia and Georgia. The first Intercock was hosted by Tbilisi in 2002 and to date Tbilisi has hosted five Intercocks. The general idea was/is that the Intercock host rotates from year to year and Baku and Yerevan have also hosted their fair share of these illustrious events.

Lady Frankenstein is proud to have a collection of unique drinking vessels to commemorate these hashing get-togethers which brought together hashers from as far afield as the UK, Norway, Switzerland, Russia and many other locations and numbers of attendees regularly exceeded 120 hashers.

Georgia is a very friendly place and it is not uncommon to be stopped by locals and invited into their garage or to a picnic for wine and Cha Cha (think of it as the local moonshine). The TH3 is well suited for both runners and walkers as trails are both hilly and adventurous and yet manageable for walkers! As has been the tradition over the past several years, the TH3 usually meets at a central location in the city, a local city park with excellent beer near, and once all are gathered (and properly pre-lubed with beer) the pack heads out together to the run site, be it via personal cars or taxis.

As of the pre-COVID period the TH3 had run a total of 463 hashes with most hashes represented by a small pack of hashers, usually anywhere from about 10 to 20 hashers. All are welcome and appreciated. *On On, Crash Test Dummy*



And a little Baku Hash House Harriers History by Down Under Ware:

An Englishman, an Irishman, and a Scotsman walked into a bar... now we all know how that ends! But, just maybe, that is how the Baku Hash House Harriers was formed. This was sometime back in 1996 (sounds like a 25 Year Anniversary Run was due in the lovely year of the COVID 2021?), the bar was some ever-seedy establishment, probably just off Fountain Square. Just possibly, the Englishman responsible was Snickers, later renamed Sir Snickers, affectionately, or not-so-affectionately, accurately, or not-so-accurately, but regardless, he's labelled as one of Baku Hash's finest Founding Fathers. Sir Snickers started his hashing career back in Dar es Salaam with the dinosaurs and can still be seen on the occasional trail in Baku, when he manages to sneak back in past border control and stay upright. And according to him, the above is, in fact, total bollocks.

So, in his own words, Sir Snickers writes, "When I arrived in Baku, in mid August, 1996, there was a small group that had started in early June that year for an informal run followed by beer on Saturday

afternoons. I joined in as soon as I found out about it. That was, I think, run number 7. Soon after, four of us, Richard Price and his wife, Mike from the US embassy, and I, decided to start a formal hash group. In those days, the hash was small and most members were expats. Hashes tended to start in the area of what is now the Hilton Hotel, as the originators lived in that area, though On Ins were often at Charlie's Bar, where it all started. Charlie was a Brit, I think from somewhere in the Reading area. The bar, just North of the centre, was closed down for tax misdemeanors and subsequently pulled down for a road-widening scheme.

This first hash collapsed in 1998 when nearly all ex-pats left. A new hash started up not long afterwards, and some members had cars and often the hash was out of town. After a while, several of us left, when the attitude on the hash became more of a rag than a run.

I returned to the hash two or three years later, by which time the hash had reorganized. I cannot remember by whom, but Ben Hodgson (Sir Moonboots – then GM), Phyllis Lyon (Stoned Banshee) and Suzie Cornell (Teletubby), really put the third

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hash on its feet. Pam Kemsley (Lady Frankenstein) was a loyal Baku hasher until she left to become GM in Tbilisi hash and several other Baku hashers also went on to Tbilisi.

When I re-joined, the On In was at a bar at the corner of Malakan Gardens. We then moved to a pub at the end of Alizade Street. Mention should be made of the fact that the bar in Malakan Gardens and the one in Alizade Street were both repossessed to become clothes shops, reflecting the strict dress requirements and style of the hash! Next stop was Finnegan's, just up the road. There we stayed until the head barman, Eldar, left to set up his own place, HOPS.

Since the start of the third Hash, there has AL-WAYS been a hash on a Sunday afternoon, come rain or sun, only the start time has changed depending on sunset. There are always some wimps who do not like running in the sun, or in the rain. I well remember one hash when the hare set the trail with tomato ketchup in the snow, and a few where the hare led the way as the chalk was washed away faster than it was set down - but the hash continued. We used to have bus runs to a location out of town, when numbers were higher to meet the cost, and two or three times a year there would be an away weekend, though attendance on the Sunday run could be poor. I remember one, many years ago, when the mud was so thick on people's shoes on the Sunday run that admittance to a pub on the way back to Baku was refused. I have been in UK since just before COV-ID-19 last year, and cannot wait to get back to the hash. I know it carries on in true hash spirit, (beer)."

There's nothing wrong with Sir Snickers' memory. The ever-meticulously kept records show the GM's from 2002 as: Moonboots; Bald Eagle; Moonboots; Teletubby; Lady Frankenstein; Table Dancing Queen; Treesy Rider; Iron Maiden; (some tweaking might be needed about this time, but we think...) Baku Hilton; Fill My Box; Spank Me; Peanut Bladder Small Bits; One Girl Party; VegeMuncher; Shameless; Putin Pussy; Whisky Hole-Ahhh (current).

These same records reveal this important snippet - the first hash (starting 1996) ended after 100 runs.

When the third hash started up "It was not until we had done about 20 runs that we found out that there had been a previous Baku Hash and that it had stopped after their 100th run. So we added 100 to all our runs to keep the record going." The date of Hash 101, the restart of this third and current BAH3, was 20/09/2002. There were 7 in attendance, 5 of whom have Hash handles: Moonboots; Fiver; Hands On; Sick as a Dog on a Train; Suffocation.

Over the years, the Baku Hash has been a transient mob of drunken runners and walkers, with numbers rising and falling over the years, depending on the influx and exodus of expats. At one point, there would often be fifty, or more, on trail. Numbers have dwindled in recent years, but in the early years of its existence, every May, Hashers from Azerbaijan, Georgia and Armenia would come together for the Intercaucasus (Intercock) and draw in the odd halfmind from around the globe. The most recent global gathering was May 2019, with just over 80 hashers joining from Baku, Qatar, Georgia, Norway, UAE, Singapore, Belgium, Italy and the UK, for the Baku 1000th Run.

Today's hash is MisManaged by an enthusiastic and motley crew of both local and expat runners and walkers. These half-minds still gather for a Thirsty Thursday evening run from HOPS Pub, Tarlan Aliyarbeyov St, and trails are still laid for Sunday afternoon runs. The hash language is English. Total runs as of the beginning of the COVID period was 1082.

If you find yourself passing through the Caucasus, head to Baku and find Hops Pub, Home of the Baku Hash. Eldarling – Hops Pub owner, the GM Whisky Hole-Ahhh, ex-GM Peanut Bladder Small Bits, RA Blue Vein, and other loyal hashers will not be far away. There is a public facebook page that you can send a direct message to for the start point for the Sunday run. Once the hash has met you in person, and deemed you truly dysfunctional enough, you can join the private facebook group for all the latest and greatest hash trash. Here's to seeing you on trail someday.

A step closer to a hash museum!

Work starts to clear the site!

The Royal Selangor Club still overlooks the iconic cricket pitch in the heart of KL. Many generation of early hashers would have drunk here, and when I visited Kuala Lumpur this is where I was entertained by what is possibly the last generation of KL expatriates. This is where there is the hash bar, where the hash genealogy stretches across a whole wall, where there are great collections of hash memorabilia on display.


This is where hashers have gathered for several big international hash events - often to the disdain of non-hash members who have not been impressed with body surfing across the flooded cricket pitch, or harriettes daring to enter the men only sections of the club. The whole building is deep in hash history.

However, the true roots of the hash have always been considered to be the separate club house that stood behind the main building. Here the food was (we might presume) cheaper, and the atmosphere (certainly) more relaxed. This was where some of the hashers lived, usually temporarily after just arriving in country.

(This might have been less common than we have previously presumed.)

The Ha

This was the famous 'Hash House', possibly named after leftover food being hashed together on a Monday night, or possibly a reflection of the

more mixed racial or social groups that met here. (Note that there is no evidence supporting this). The club house no longer exists - it was knocked down when a new road took off a corner of the club's grounds. Indeed, there is only one known photograph of the building.


For many years, The Hash Foundation had the intention of replicating the building to house a hash museum. Land was acquired sometime ago (the author visited the plot when a KL hash set off from the site) but it has laid untouched for many years. During the delay, the plans for a replica of the old club house were scaled back to a far more modest building. However, the Hash Foundation have finally announced that work has started on the project.

Although the site continues to be used as a venue for celebratory runs, 20 years have elapsed without any real progress in building a 'new' Hash House. The current HHF Board of trustees have shelved the initial grandiose design and have adopted a more pragmatic approach to realising our initial ambitions - to build an interim facility which can later be expanded to the more elaborate facility. Sadly, a significant amount of the funds generated from Interhash '98 and from donations received from the founding and other trustees has been depleted through obligatory payment of 'Cukai Tanah / Taksiran' (Land Tax / Assessment / Rates). Full details of these are available in the AC-COUNTS section of this website.

Letter L

Lofty London H3


Lofty started hashing back in 1979 and is now approaching 1000 runs with **London H3** as well as 500 plus with **West London**. Was owner of hash dog *Henry* who made his hash debut in August 2010.


Lofty Roy McManus South Of Perth H3 (Australia)

Was trail master at InterHash Goa 2002, which was no mean feat given he usually lives in Perth, Australia. Usually runs with **South of Perth H3** under the close supervision of his wife and hashing soul mate *Yo Adrian*.

Lone Ranger Rob Thomas Dubai Desert H3 (U.A.E.)

Was one of the most consistent runners in the early days of the Desert Hash, completing 656 of their first 996 hashes. He was regularly accused of having survived a public school education and was a noted hash cash.





Lonesome Cowboy Dirk Brueggemann Kabul H3 (Afghanistan)

Lonesome Cowboy was joint founder, along with *Sex Immigrant*, of **Kabul H3** in August 2002. He had previously hashed in Bonn (Germany).

Long John La Jolla H3 (USA)

Long John was a bridge engineer by profession and a hasher by choice. He started hashing in the early 80s with **La Jolla** and then moved to San Francisco, where he hashed with whatever group was easiest to get to that week. A noted hash traveller, he often appeared at the major European events. A man of many surprises, Long John could spend most of the evening semi-comatose (you checked not so much that he was awake, but whether he was still alive) then around midnight was likely to get up and join the band – Long John being a talented soul singer and harmonica player.

Longley, W.B Mother Hash (Malaysia)

Brian Longley served as Joint Master of Mother Hash in 1950, 1952, 1954 and 1955.

Lord, the Chris Eden Hobart H3 (Australia)

Hashed with Penang in 1965, although only as a short-term visitor. He returned to Australia in 1967, where he founded **Hobart H3**. By 2001 he had completed 1,700 plus runs with them. In 1995 *Magic* acknowledged his 241 consecutive runs (December 31 1990 to May 1995) to be a Hash World Record.

Lord Chicken Fucker John Mcallen Pattaya H3 (Thailand)

Chicken was a prolific Pattaya H3 hasher, his 1st run taking place on the 2nd December 1991. He built up an amazing total of 1224 runs. He achieved 1000 runs, while only missing 18 hashes. Was Pattaya GM in 1996, 1997 & 1998 as well as being the beer truck driver for many years. It was as RA that LCF really excelled, 'his brand of humour was not unsimilar to Tommy Coopers, but was certainly more hilarious and unique, with him continuing as RA up to his last run'. Although it has been many years since LCF actually ran, (well he was 76) he always did the walker's circuit. John had also been an active member of the Pattaya Sports Club and had been Softball chairman for several years. LCF passed away in March 2022.

Lord Deep Throat Terry Mechan

Hong Kong/Wirral and Chester H3 (England)

A Hong Kong hasher back in the early days, first running with **Southside H3** in 1977. On his return to England he hashed with **Cheltenham and Cotswold.** In 1987 transferred to Liverpool, where he founded (or co-founded) **Wirral and Chester H3**. In 1993 he returned to Gloucester where he formed a Men's Only hash (monthly runs and European tours) and the virtual **Hash Founders Hash.** A noted broadcaster, for which he was award an MBE, which led to his naming as *Lord Deep Throat*.

Lord Krishna Sashi Varma Chennai H3 (India)

Was the founder of **Chennai H3** and served on the Goa Interhash 2002 Committee. His notable contribution to that event was the pre-ramble named Interhash Yatra Down South. This consisted of travelling by train from Chennai to Goa.

Lord Luchan Paul Eldred Pattaya H3 (Thailand)

Made quite an impact in a short hash career that took in 280 **Pattaya H3** runs and a dozen or so with the **DirtRoad**. *Lord Luchan* passed away in February 2020.

Lorna Dunes Lorna Greenway Houston H3 (USA)

Lorna's virgin hash was with **Brenham H3** on October 3, 1991. It was a camp out and her first date with

Geek, GM of Houston H3). Houston H3 became her regular hash and she has run and/or walked 1,231 weekly trails. She has been Hash Cash on three different occasions, was Joint Master in 2018, and Haberdasher from 2015-2018. Lorna and Geek were married on July 23, 1994. In 2022 she was awarded the Pooperbowl (a venerated Houston H3 tradition since 1987). Since retiring from the travel planning business she has tried painting, mostly landscapes of the desert southwest. She also likes to hike, sing, dance, and keep Geek on his toes.

Loud Wellington H3 (New Zealand) Bob McLeod

Loud started hashing in Fiji, from where he fondly remembers being voted Asshole of the Month. After just a few days back in New Zealand he was roped in to help organize Nash Hash in Wellington, and the New Zealand GM'ship followed. During his year in office he 'attended about 97% of all clubs registered at the time'. Loud passed away in September 2021.

Love Canal Mike Rust EdmONtON H3 (Canada)

Joh*n Splash N Dash* Cosco and Mike *Love Canal* Rust, formally of **Vancouver H3**, brought hashing to Edmonton in 1991.

Love Chicken Avi Bindra Delhi H3 (India)

Avi came from a military family. He attended the prestigious Doon School, and later ran his own travel agency which brought him into contact with

the Delhi diplomatic community. He became one of the giants of Indian hashing, founding Delhi H3 (with Charlie Stevens) on 31 December 1983. At that point, Delhi H3 was the second hash club in India after Bombay. He was a huge personality and loved to party. During one run, held on the Indian festival of Holi, he and his fellow hare indulged in Bhang Lassi, a traditional local stimulant. They felt they had been out hours setting a trail - which lasted exactly 20 minutes. In March 1995 Avi organised a highly successful All India Nash Hash in Delhi. The event is remembered for a wild Saturday night party - and nude dancing and singing close to the Prime Minister's residence during the Sunday morning hangover run. When Avi felt that the Delhi hash had become a little too much of a running club, he founded Party Hash (October 1997). Avi was a great traveller and attended many international events such as The West London 500 and the Diamond Jubilee in Kuala Lumpur. He even managed to attend hash events in neighbouring Pakistan. Avi sadly passed away on 29 October 2012 at the early age of 59. Over the Easter Weekend in 2016 Delhi Hash hosted All India Nash Hash in Agra in Avi's honour. It was called "An Ode to Love Chicken". Rest easy Love Chicken With thanks to White Trash

LSD

Perth Harriettes (Australia)

A double Interhash drinking champion, the winner in 2010 and 2012.

LUC

Karen Woo


Kabul H3 (Afghanistan

Although no hasher has been killed on the run, Kabul lost a popular figure when Karen *LUC* Woo

was murdered, along with nine other aid workers, in the 2010 Badakhshan massacre. After leaving school at 16, Woo danced with the London Contemporary Dance Theatre before completing her education and becoming a surgeon at St Mary's hospital in London. She had given up a high paying job with BUPA to work in Afghanistan. *On On LUC*.

Lucky Linda Hall Norfolk H3 (England)

Received her 1000th mug in 2017 and is a regular feature of the hash trash, for example 'Lucky managed to fall over and leave her imprint in the long grass and was then terrified by a charging cow' or perhaps this mention that she managed to lose her sunglasses on a rainy day.

Croydon born and educated at Great Yarmouth *LYM* has clocked up over 1000 plus runs with **Norfolk H3**.

Lyon, Dave Hong Kong

A key member of the 1978 Hong Kong Interhash committee where he was treasurer and 'general helper.'

Caitlin dos Santos

Sans Clue (France) Diva H3 (International)

Discovered hashing in Paris soon after leaving university and became a regular member of first **Paris H3** and then **Sans Clue H3**. From 1998 to 2009, she was a regular committee member and helped organized events such as French Nash Hash. She was a great hash traveller, particularly with **DIVA H3**. *MaBouche* moved to São Paulo in 2009 and returned for a second spell in Paris from 2012 to 2019. Now back in Brazil where she runs a bar. One of the few hashers to have her own hash song!

Mad George George Wiles

Edinburgh H3 (Scotland)

Mad George was one of the ringleaders behind Edinburgh gaining their reputation of being hash animals in the early days of British hashing.

Mad Rushin Alice Johnson

An American hasher and author of the 1990 publication 'Half a Mind'. This was something of a pioneer project and offered a basic guide to Hashing with the emphasis on 'How to Set a Hash'.

Mad Swede

Jan Andersson

Westra Aros Gurka H3 (Sweden)


Mad Swede worked as a chef, most notably for the Swedish Ambassador in New York. During his first New York posting in the late seventies there was no hash, so this former water polo and badminton player turned to running, completing 10km in 41 minutes, a very respectable time for such a big guy. He became a regular hasher during a second posting to New York (1988-1992) and continued during a shorter spell in Washington. On returning to Sweden, he became a leading figure in the local hash scene, filling most committee roles over the years, most notably as long term haberdasher. By then knee problems were limiting Mad Swede to walking but he showed a supernatural instinct for finding the trail. He and partner Double Decker occasionally staged weekend hashes at their Westra Aros home and after retirement this grew into the Westra Aros Gurka

Hash History -

The date of the very first hash!

In the Spotlight – 1938 By Ed "Hazukashii" Howell First published 14th March 2022

Still to this day, no one has found any documentation that specifically defines when the Hash House Harriers ran their first trail in Kuala Lumpur. Conventional wisdom had placed the date as sometime between September and December 1938. About six months ago, my friend Colin "Hema" Snow sent me some interesting news from his personal interactions and a letter from Torch Bennett, that outlined his estimation of the founding date to be mid-summer 1939. Unfortunately, Torch was not on the first run, having taken leave in late November of 1938 and not returning to Kuala Lumpur until late July 1939. Torch also made it clear that "G" had not yet arrived in Kuala Lumpur as of the date of his departure. Although verbal recollections by other early hashers had generally pointed towards a start date of late 1938, Torch was adamant that he was right. (Ed: This date presumes that Torch joined some time during first half dozen hashes).


While reviewing more documents on the matter, another letter has shed more light on the situation. First, a little background. When Tim "Magic" Hughes was researching the history of the HHH back in the 1980s, he contacted many old hashers to get their story, and in 1987 came in contact with Frank Woodward. Frank was one of the few early hashers before the war, and is identified on the "List of Office Bearers" of Mother Hash, as a Joint Master in both 1948 and 1949. He would continue on, working and hashing in KL until his departure in 1953. Magic had recently published his "Harrier International World Hash Handbook 86/87" and started mailing out periodical HHH News on a subscription basis under the title "Harrier International." As an introduction, Magic sent Frank copies of his work and asked for some of his recollections on his time with the HHH in KL.

Frank Woodward replied in a letter, stating . . . "I left Guernsey . . . in January 1939 and arrived in Kuala Lumpur about mid-February, 1939. I had been booked into the Selangor Club Chambers by my boss. At my first breakfast, I was invited to join the Hash House Harriers and as I had been a cross-country runner at school, I was delighted to accept." Frank makes the most specific statement on record, for the actual founding date with "I took part in the sixth or seventh run of the club since it was founded." Having run his first trail in February 1939, that would narrow down the date of the first run to sometime in December 1938, or possibly the first week of January 1939. Since there were a couple significant holidays in that timeframe, mid to early December 1938 is the most likely date of the first hash trail. It could not be sooner, as Torch had departed KL in late November 1938, and "G" was not there yet and the HHH had not started.


There was at least one account of the earlier Kuala Lumper Harriers (that ran in the city from the early 1920s to the mid-1930s) in the Malay Mail (newspaper) in 1932. The oldest actual Hash House Harriers document we currently have, to the best of my knowledge, that specifies an actual event date is the notice for the upcoming 100th Run, which occurred on Friday 15 Aug 1941, just 17 weeks before hashing was suspended due to the onset of WWII.


Frank's letter also includes other insights into the early days of the HHH. He goes on to say . . .


"In those good old days, most of us Hash House members had Malay car drivers . . . and the procedure on the weekly run days was for the two 'hares' to go in a car with their haversacks full of torn-up paper and the boot of their car loaded up with a large galvanized tin bath packed with ice, bottled beer and ginger beer,




Mother Hash celebrated their 70th anniversary on 7th December 2008 which they claimed was the actual anniversary. However (1) it is uncertain how they came to this date and (2) there is a rumour that they realised this was incorrect, but only *after* the T-shirts had been printed, so nothing was said.









Torch Bennett left KL for leave in November 1938. There was no hash at the time and G had not yet arrived in town. *Torch* returned in July 1939 to find the hash was up and running (Red). He seems to have believed that he had only missed a few runs (5 or-6?) which gives a mid summer starting for the hash. (Black)

to a pre-arranged starting point and then set off to lay the paper trails. The beer and ginger beer were provided by the 'hares' each week at their own expense. The club never had any funds as such and administration was minimal."

Frank continued to explain that prior to the war, that trails were generally A to B, and that once the pack had assembled and set off running, the hare's driver would lead all the other cars to the finish point. He also states "After numerous false trails had been investigated the 'hounds' eventually arrived at the finish point where the 'hares' would have already started on the beer and ginger beer. Shandies were found to be much more refreshing than beer by itself." Which, to me, is another indictment on the false narrative some hashers believe, that hashing has always been about excessive alcohol.

Another revelation was that after the rebirth starting in 1946, trails were much more commonly A to A. Frank stated "After the war not many members of the H.H.H had car drivers, especially the newcomers who had come to Malaya for the first time . . . starting and finishing points of the runs [were] at the same place; otherwise the routine was exactly as before."

In closing, Frank finished with "I am so glad to hear that the Hash House Harriers clubs are spreading round the world, a fact of which I was quite unaware until very recently." Both Frank's and Torch's letters are recollections of events that took place more than 40 years prior, so we have to take them at face value. Just like Frank states, new information continues to be presented to us on the history of the HHH, and more research will continue to expand our knowledge of the origins of this fascinating sport. More research will need to be done on Frank, but as of the time of his letter (circa 1987), he listed himself as a non-running member of the Tamar Valley H3, in Devonshire, UK.


Falkland Islands

A few notes on the Falkland Islands H3

- When thinking of setting the first hash the hares opted for the traditional Monday evening. The first hash took place on September 16th, 1985.
- Winter had not yet set in, so the weather was likely to be 'acceptable'.
- Gale force winds might still be a problem and considerable thought went into finding something suitable for laying the trail. Neither paper nor sawdust were going to stay in place.
- McEwn cans (full) might have stood up to the wind but not to passing soldiers or farmers.

THE MINEFIELDS

- In the end 2m by 2m card was used for the trail, with this being held down by rocks.
- Finding hashers was not the problem with 2500 bored men in military camps.
- However, the founding fathers didn't want a mass turnout of non-hashers. They probably un-
- der-publicised the first run, which was staged with only 6 hashers, including the hare.
- A couple of experienced hashers, who had planned to set a run a few weeks later, were accidentally left off the invitation list.
- Terence *Bunter* Kavanagh happily voted himself *GM*.



Early Malaysian Hashes

Taiping H3

- In December 1977 Butch Cheah, who had hashed somewhere (probably with Mother Hash?) decided he wanted a hash in his home town.
- He believed Taiping had some excellent hash terrain, and presumed there were enough people who liked beer. Butch therefore contacted a couple of Taiping residents now hashing with Mother Hash.
- They set the first hash on Christmas Eve, 1976.
- More KL hashers than locals turned up, and this is considered an unofficial run.
- The first **official** hash took place on 2/1/78.
- Butch set the trail from Lake Garde with help from Thomas Ong.
- 50 turned up for the 5.15 start.

- A committee was set up, which included Butch Cheah and Thomas Ong, who had provided the first T-shirts.
- Derek Choe offered his office for future meetings. The hash were underway!

Taiping is a city located in Perak, Malaysia. It is approximately 48 kilometres northwest of Ipoh, the capital of Perak, and 78 kilometres southeast of George Town, Penang. With a population of 245,182 it is the second largest city in Perak after Ipoh, the state capital.

Taiping took over Kuala Kangsar's role as the state capital from 1876 to 1937, but was then replaced by Ipoh. Growth slowed after that, but in recent years the town has been developing rapidly again. Perak State Museum is located here.

Taiping has the reputation of being the wettest town in Peninsular Malaysia. The average annual rainfall is about 4,000mm in Taiping, while the peninsula's average is 2,000mm – 2,500mm. The unusually high rainfall has led to a fertile collection of flora and there are century-old rain trees in the Taiping Lake Gardens.

Taiping was ranked one of the top 3 Sustainable Cities in the World.

Early Malaysian Hashes

Teluk AnsonH3

- The first attempt at a hash took place on 14/2/74 and was described as 'half hearted with only 3 locals turning up to join 33 hashers from Ipoh' The hashers got off Selaba Express to 'run around in circles'. Ipoh hashers enjoyed the run and trashed the Cheong Kee Restaurant afterwards.
- The run was listed as Ipoh's 516th run, while Teluk would try for Run Number One at a later date.
- On 19th July, 1975, 19 locals and 19 Ipoh hashers turned up for the second attempt at a hash. They didn't go back to the Cheong Kee Restaurant as they thought the management might still remember them! Instead they used the California Restaurant.

• After that hashes were staged every two weeks and at the time of their 50th run were thinking of staging weekly hashes and opening up to women.

Teluk Intan is a town in Hilir Perak District, Perak, Malaysia. It is the district capital with an estimated population of around 120,000.

In the early days, the town was known as Teluk Mak Intan, after a female Mandailing trader. It was here that the Perak rulers held court from 1528 until Kuala Kangsar became the royal town in 1877.

During the British protectorate era the named was changed to Teluk Anson (Anson Bay), in honour of a British officer and last Lieutenant-Governor of Penang, Major-General Sir Archibald Edward Harbord Anson. In 1982, during the centenary of the town's establishment, the name was changed again to Teluk Intan (Diamond Bay) by the Sultan of Perak.

The Leaning Tower of Teluk Intan is one of the town attractions. The town has a number of colonial buildings and Chinese shop houses, together with modern buildings and a modern cinema.

Arrested on the hash stories

Trouble in Dar es Salaam and Dhaka

Shakes offers an eye-witness account of the time the Dar hash was arrested.

Dar es Salaam (Tanzania) in 1982 was a hardship posting. No no cheese, no cereals, no bread - just fresh fruit and giant lobsters. Petrol was often unavailable for days at a time.

There was beer, but you had to go to the brewery with a crate of empty bottles on the one day a week the factory was bottling. Break a bottle and you could not buy beer (Hashers stealing bottles from the limited hash stocks was a major and reoccurring problem).

My father worked for British Airways and once a month would send a crate of goodies to us.

Having received the latest crate in the afternoon of the hash, I negotiated with my wife that she would wait to open the crate until I returned. It seemed only fair that I promised to miss the circle and get back early. (I was equally excited at opening the crate!)

Anyway, we had a good run through some farmland and bush country between the town and the beaches and then I headed home as promised. On the way I saw two or three army trucks racing in the other direction. This was not normal, as the army didn't usually have petrol for so many vehicles - but I gave it little thought.

Having unpacked the box I wandered across the school campus to the apartment of a hash buddy, who had a few gifts in the box. He was not back from the hash.

Worried about the dark roads home, I checked with other hash friends from the large hash contingent of teachers who lived on campus.

Nobody was back!

It seems the small farms the hash had jogged through belonged to the army. The trucks I had passed had surrounded everybody, and then called the police.

The entire hash had been put into a convoy and ordered to drive to Oyster Bay Police Station.

The GM and his wife, not the nicest of people, had decided to break convoy and drive home.

The police were furious and kept everybody until three in the morning.

As the mood lightened the hashers were able to bring their beers into the cells.

When asked if they wanted to phone the embassy the hash scribe, Geoff Williams, told them not to bother, because he was already there.

There were a few tense days when the GM and committee members were uncertain if there would be any follow up from the authorities, but the hash met on schedule two weeks later.

The GM and his wife were noted misers who collected and guarded the hash cash like Scrooge the day before Christmas. We must have had thousands of shillings saved which was never spent on the hash.

Mr and Mrs GM had a break-in and all the hash cash disappeared. The pair never hashed again.

A while later they refused to pull over for the President's convoy and spent their own night under arrest.





- In June, 1987 Dhaka staged an old town run, a regular pre-COVID event. Having left the Armenian Church they followed the trail to Lalbagh Fort. (See picture below)
- They wandered around this large site and then headed for the gate, intending to continue the hash. Instead they found the doors locked by the police.
- Earlier the trail had circled the Central Jail, where the hash horn and general loud behaviour had made the authorities fear a protest or even a distraction for a breakout.
- Luckily the hash were not without influence and *The Brigadier* and *Loco* were able to defuse the situation.

Hussain Muhammad Ershad was a Bangladeshi Army Chief and politician who served as the President of Bangladesh from 1983 to 1990. He seized power as head of the army during a bloodless coup against President Abdus Sattar and declared himself President in 1983. He subsequently won the controversial 1986 presidential election. Ershad served in the Presidential office until 1990, when he was forced to resign following a popular pro-democracy mass uprising led by Khaleda Zia and Sheikh Hasina. During his tenure Ershad pursued devolution reforms, privatization of nationalised industries and an expansion of the national highway system. Ershad was awarded the United Nations' Population Award in 1987 for his contributions to population control and environmental issues.

Run 170

- Run 170 started in the neighbourhood of Banai and went across the Airport Road to the golf course where there was to be a drink stop in the club bar.
- The only instruction was *not* to run across the greens.
- Guess what? The pack took a short cut straight across the greens!
- What might have brought a slap from the club committee became altogether more serious when armed guards appeared from the shelter of the trees.
- Prime Minster Ershad happened to be teeing off, just as the hash made their dash across the fairways.
- The hash opted to miss the drink stop and disappeared into the distance.
