- · Seal Sucker Ran to lighthouse


And *Mopiko* charged for looking like Gilligan, with his upturned hat. *Worm* for asking - "What's Gilligan's Island?"


What happens:

The hash comes to Yogyakarta



The Yogyakarta 400th Run Book gave a wonderful account of the very first hash in the city. We reproduce the highlights here. Note hashing was widespread throughout Indonesia at the time so many people on the first run had hashed before and already had a hash name.

Run 1
May 7th, 1979
4.00pm
Hares: Rob Rooter Varley
'demented doyen of shig-pit, marsh and sawah'
and
Pinhead Kilsby
'notorious swamp-rat commando'

Description of the run: 'the lucky runners were treated to a grueling chase through some embarrassingly well-populated areas.'

The run included: 'a cascading torrent of water as clear and wholesome as a Bombay sewer in high summer.'

Length: 'Overly long for some, easy for others'.

Yogyakarta is in central Java. It is the capital city of the Special Region of Yogyakarta.

The city is an important centre for classical Javanese fine arts and culture.

Yogyakarta is home to a large student population and there are dozens of schools and universities.

Yogyakarta was the Indonesian capital from 1946 to 1948 during the Indonesian National Revolution.

The city's population was 373,589 in the 2020 Census.

For tourists it is a base for visiting Borobudur or climbing one of the surrounding volcanoes.







Ian 'Pirelli' Callander *A photo tribute*

Hash legend Pirelli passed away on Sunday 12th February after complications arising from minor surgery.

Ian started hashing in 1969. For his 50th hashing anniversary, he had a T-shirt made up of the different hashes he was a member of:

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As hashing spread around Malaysia a **Penang H3** chapter was started in 1965. A number of Air Force personnel serving at the adjacent Butterworth Base heard about it and joined in the fun.

The RAAF (Royal **Australian** Air Force) had its own school on Penang and a teacher, one Jack Salmons, became involved with the new kennel.

Jack subsequently relocated to Melbourne.

He longed for the good old days in Penang. Therefore he and another ex Penang H3 member, Ian Rippingale, persuaded a few others with previous Penang Hash experience to come to a family day event that would be preceded by a traditional Hash run.

Thus the first **Melbourne H3** run was arranged for Sunday 25th April 1971 from the Selby School Residence.

Ten runners turned up and followed a 3.9 mile trail along local roads and well defined tracks. Jack wrote a short run report, or Re-hash, and, with typical H3 overstatement, prophetically declared "you have been chosen to create history".

Hashers A to Z

Letter P

Pecker John Gregory Ras al-Khaimah H3 (U.A.E.)

The first hash in the United Arab Emirates was not Dubai or Abu Dubai but the northern emirate of Ras al-Khaimah where cement works and harbour projects were helping to fuel the rapid growth of the rest of the country. *Peck* 42 years of hashing and *er* was the leading hasher completing 600 of their first 900 runs.

Penis Head Daytona H3 (USA)

Tops the **Daytona H3** run list with 1148 hashes. He joined them on Run Number 3 and has been a loyal hasher ever since. Each year from 1988 to 1994 he topped the run total list including a 100% turnout in 1994. He also achieved a personal best of 59 consecutive hashes without missing one.

Petal Glyn Price Barnes H3 (England)

A noted English hasher with 700 plus runs with **Barnes H3** and nearly 600 with **Old Coulsdon H3**.

Pete the Pilot Pete Cracknell London H3 (England)

Peter was introduced to hashing in Khartoum while visiting his brother *Bonkers*. On returning home he saw an advertisement for the London hash and so a legend was born. He went on to clock up over 900 runs with **London H3** and attended many other events, with **Westcombe H3** and the **Friday 13th** runs being favourites. He campaigned for better beer at hashes and was beer master at Inter-Hash Cardiff and EuroHash 2007. *Peter has recently passed away.* On On

Peterfile

Hanoi H3 (Vietnam)

Peterfile spent 7 years hashing in Hanoi, including a spell as Grand Master (2008-2009) before founding **Hoi An H3**.

Pether, David Berkshire H3 (England) UK Nash Hash Secretary in 1987.

Phantom Dave Winter Auckland H3 (New Zealand)

Phantom began his hashing career with Muscat H3 (Oman) from 1978 till 1981, after which he returned to New Zealand. He is a former Grand Master of Auckland H3, where he has clocked up 1400 runs over 42 years of hashing. He also has 1232 runs with Auckland Hussies. He was a founder member of the Mangawhai Heads and Splash Hash. Phantom has attended every Interhash since Pattaya in 1986 until Fiji in 2018. He can also claim several Pan Asia, Eurohash and an Africa Interhash to his credit which, when added to New Zealand Nash hashes and other special events adds up to a lifetime total of over 3150 hash runs.

Phantom II Jack Walker Melbourne H3 (Australia)

Jack Walker joined **Melbourne H3** in 1986 and is now on 1600 plus runs. He was GM in 1993 and is

the current trail master. In 2001 he won the Jack Salmons Award for his outstanding contribution to the hash.

Phileas Fogg Don Pumfrey Kampala H3 (Uganda)

Don *Phileas Fogg* Pumfrey spent three decades running and drinking on the African hash scene. Starting in Nairobi in 1976, he went on to have spells as GM in both Kampala and Maseru as well as being a long term member of **Dar es Salaam H4** in their golden period of the late 1990s.

Philips, Arthur Bangkok H3 (Thailand)

Arthur hashed with **Mother Hash** before moving to Bangkok where he was on Run Number 1. While many discovered hashing wasn't for them, Arthur was still hashing 3 years later.

Phillips. John

In 1984 John Phillips set a record of 18 minutes for the infamous King Street Run.

Philthy Phil Chapman Doncaster and Eltham H3 (Australia)

An Australian who was hashing with Jakarta from the mid-seventies. In later life he returned to Melbourne, where he ran with **Doncaster and Eltham H3** and supported Melbourne's Collingwood Football Club. He is most famous for attending every Interhash from Hong Kong in 1978 to Fiji in 2018. Ironically *Drainoil*, his only rival for the Interhash attendance record, also missed Goa. (*Ed: A full article on Interhash attendance in the next issue*).

Phuah Boon Lay Mother Hash (Malaysia)

Mother Hash On-Sec in 1995 and Joint Master in 1996. Founder of **Royal Selangor H3** in 1991. Sometimes goes by the name of *No Manners*.

Pickled Fart David Greer West London H3 (England)

Has 500 plus runs with **West London** and several hundred with **London H3.**

Pigg Martyn Pegg Hong Kong H4

Hong Kong GM 1988-89. According to their own Yearbook he 'looked like Fu Manchu's aborted offspring having a bad day.'

Pigs in Space Terri Pollitz Washington H3(USA)

Terri followed husband *Gopher* to Guam only to find that he had joined the local hash group. She joined him on her first hash in March 1993 and has continued to hash ever since. *Piggy* and *Ghoper* have now returned to Washington but they are great hash travellers, both in the USA and to world events. Son *Hedgehog* also hashed.

Friends of the Mole (England)
665 hashes and 11 harings with the Friends of the
Mole H3.

Pimp Roger Thorn Tamar H3 (England)

Has 1000 plus runs with **Tamar H3** where he was GM in 2018, RA in 2015 and JM in 2000. He has also been long term webmaster.

Pimp Bob Finch

Pattaya Dirt Road (Thailand)

Was on **Dirt Road Hash** Number 1 and has 162 hashes with 18 hares. Has the honour of being a Dirt Road Judge.

Pink Bits Guangzhou H3 (China)

While expats tend to come and go, a growing number of local runners have been able to clock up hashes. *Pink Bits* leads the run total table with 396 hashes at the last count.

Pink Panter Brants H3 (Netherlands)

A key member the Dutch hash scene with Amsterdam and **Brants H3.** He is involved in the committee of the upcoming Eurohash and is currently the

regional webmaster for Europe.

Pink Panter

Frankfurt H3 (Germany)

Formerly a very active hasher with Frankfort. He set the ball breaker Trail in Goa back in 2002 and was always an imaginative and energetic participant in the circle. He met a Lebanese Harriette, settled down, and to the surprise of those who knew him retired from the hash.

Pink Panther Claire Ferguson Manneke Piss H3 (Belgium)

An enthusiastic Belgium hasher with 400 plus runs with **Manneke Piss H3.** Was GM 2011-12 and 2014-15 and also spent two years as beermeister. She is from Durham, UK which is how she got her name (if you sing "Durham" to the tune of Pink Panther, you'll get it!)

Pint The Boddin Family Colombo Harriettes (Sri Lanka)

The Boddin family, Eric *Pint* Dinar *Half Pint* and Shari *Quarter Pints* have, between them, clocked up over a thousand runs with the **Colombo Harriettes.**

Pippy Ugly Stocking Guangzhou H3 (China)

In 2006-07 *Piggy* became the first **Guangzhou H3** female GM in 2006-7.

Pirelli Ian Callander Glasgow H3 (Scotland)

A banker by trade, he arrived in Brunei in 1969 and discovered hashing. Although he had some doubts about the running, he loved the social side. After a posting to Calcutta, where there was no hash at the time, he resumed his hash career in Bahrain in 1974. There was then a spell in Scotland followed by Macau. Once again there was no hash, but Hong Kong was only a short boat trip away and Ian often laid trails for San Wan H3 when they came over. Between 1979-81, he completed 102 runs in 104 weeks in Singapore before moving to California where he had his first experience of mixed hashing. On returning to Glasgow, he became a hash legend with his fancy dress costumes and his record 1024 runs. The name Pirelli comes from the famous Pirelli calendar. Ian passed away in February of this year. On On!

Piss Warwick Artis Hong Kong H4

Piss Artis was an Australian GM of Hong Kong H4 in 1972-73, the third man to hold this honourbale position. He is described as 'being Oversexed (for an Australian'.

Pisser Stephen Luswata Kampala H3 (Uganda)

Stephen *Pisser* Luswata was a cricket player who introduced many of his colleagues to the **Kampala Hash.** He later became the first Ugandan GM of the kennel.

Pisstak Pitak Chantong Bangkok H4 (Thailand)

Pitak *Pisstak* Chantong was the first Bangkok Hasher to complete 1000 runs. Since then Bob *Bulle* Boulter and Tiradej Sukunwatna have also gone past that landmark.

Pissport Episkopi H3 (Cyprus)

The 1996 Interhash drinking champion.

Pissport Kev Kevin Braddock Wellington H3 (New Zealand)

Has 1600 hashes with *Wellington H3* and still hash-active.







A drinker's guide to running the world

Ah, the age-old tradition of getting tipsy and running amok. Sometimes you've just got to do it. For members of the Hash House Harriers, it's common practice. This self-professed "drinking club with a running problem" is part scavenger hunt, part exercise and part debauchery.

Not surprisingly, its members run the gamut. A hasher could be the taxi driver who just dropped you off or the lady at the money exchange booth or the CEO of a hotel chain. They might be locals, they might be expats. They might be buff Marines or sluggish video gamers. What they all have in common is a sense of humor.


The oddball club got its start 75 years ago in prewar Malaysia and now has nearly 2,000 chapters spanning all seven continents. It began with a group of British colonial officers and expats looking for ways to ease their weekend hangovers. The name came from their billet, often referred to as the Hash House, where they'd eat their monotonous corned-beef dinners, and the pastime they came up with was a wilder

version of a British paper chase.

Here's how it goes: A group of runners (aka pack of hounds) looks for clues (dashes of flour or chalk marks) on the ground to indicate the correct path. These clues are left by designated runners called hares. Here's the kicker: There are also misleading signs that lead to a dead end. In other words, nobody knows where the trail goes and someone will get lost at some point, especially because there are typically adult beverages pre-hash, at the halfway point and post-hash.

All that said, you will definitely see things on a hash that you won't see in any guidebook. And for most travelers, that is a huge bonus.

So, how exactly do you join? Most groups are very welcoming and open to newbies showing up, even if you're not a hasher at home. There is no global directory, but try a Google or Facebook search for "Hash House Harriers," and you'll find gatherings all over the world.

Hashes in Peru (the Lima group is the only one in Peru) are typically held on Saturday afternoons. The festivities start around 2 p.m. and so does the drinking. "Beer is always present, but it's also common to have pisco, a brandy made in Peru," says Jair Zuta La Rosa. Whiskey and tequila have been known to make appearances, too.

By 3 p.m., the hashing begins and a group of 20 to 120 people run for two to three hours. But it's not a marathon by any means. There's a route for runners and another for walkers -- both meet at the beer stop.

"The hash is not a competition," says La Rosa. In fact, if you're overly competitive, you may be punished for being a show-off. Punishment can also result from failing to acknowledge the beer stop or wearing new shoes or saying someone's real name instead of their hash name. (Hashers all go by nicknames, many of them R-rated, that are often selected for them by other runners). These transgressions can lead to you wearing a toilet seat around your neck or doing a "down-down," which means your must chug your beverage or pour it over your head.

After the run there's a gathering featuring lots of nonsensical, colonial hash songs and, you guessed it, more beer. La Rosa says he can't get enough of it. He started hashing in 2008 and has attended most of the hashes since.

"Some hashes are especially crazy," he says. Take, for example, the worldwide annual charity Red Dress Runs, where people sport everything from red feather boas to red heels. Or an Ale-lympics event held in Israel that involved a beer-can high jump and beer-can distance throwing. Then, there's the Extreme Ironing Run, also in Israel, where hashers run with ironing boards strapped to their backs. Other hashes are more family friendly and involve much less drinking or none at all; it just depends on the organization.

Rachel Neiman

There is something in the anarchic absurdity of the hash that appeals to people like Rachel Neiman, a lifelong Monty Python fan. "It's not about the running," she says. "I'm not a great runner, believe me. It's the crazy insanity of a group of people dashing down a Jerusalem street after Captain Caveman following sounds of 'on-on' and tootles on a vuvuzela. That's what makes it fun."

It attracts all types. The Holyland HHH has a core group of locals (mostly long-time immigrants to Israel) along with an ever-changing population of itinerant diplomats, Marines, contract workers and other expats.

In this particular hash club, you are nicknamed after the group gets to know you a little bit and after you've set a trail yourself. Four months after Neiman joined, the others still didn't know that much about her, but they did know she is from Boston. From then on, she was known as Boston Creamed. "Like most hash names," she says, "it is vaguely suggestive."

The naming ceremonies "are a big giant secret," she says. "It involves flour and beer, and you need to take at least three showers before your hair gets clean."

Sheridan Becker discovered the wild and wooly world of HHH while she was living and working as a marketing manager in Hong Kong. During her travels over the past 25 years, she has hashed with five packs in four countries, through the open markets of Hong Kong, the green fields of Ireland and the beautiful beaches of Jamaica.

These days, she opts for family-style hashes, which welcome children by offering soft drinks instead of alcohol and by toning down the drinking songs. With her 10 and 12-year-old boys in tow, they conquer the wide open spaces of Brussels. Alexander, her younger son, delights in finding the trail markers, eating the big dinner at the end of the hash and is always surprised that "all these older people are in shape."

The greatest part, Becker says, is that no membership fees are required, so you just chip in for food and drinks. Her advice for newbies: "Don't come with expectations, so you won't end up disappointed," she says. "Folks without a sense of humor or adventure should think twice about participating in a hash." Dr. Jurg Gassman has hashed with more than a dozen packs in 10 countries spread over three continents, from the narrow streets of Tokyo to the heat and dust of Karachi to the beaches of Nassau to the leafy residential areas of Toronto to the bicycle lanes of Holland. He started at 23 and now he's 51. It hasn't been all fun and games, however. Gassman says he once had a standoff with what he believes was the yakuza, Japan's notorious homegrown mafia. One yakuza nearly drew a sword on him and his fellow hashers.

Despite that sketchy encounter, he says: "It's an opportunity to let your hair down and have some fun," he says. "Most of the guys I met were bankers, lawyers, diplomats, spies, soldiers. They're all crazy, that's the nice thing. You can't take yourself too seriously if you're hashing."

If you go, he says, don't wear anything new. Some hashes are civilized, others are merciless.

Also, keep in mind: "You have to be non-PC tolerant and accept that it can cross the line. I've seen teetotalers as members and they enjoy themselves, though it does tend to be the exception."

He is a member of the Hash House Harriers, a subculture whose members unite through a shared love of running, exploration and, perhaps most important to them, drinking beer.

The run club says it has more than 2,000 active chapters around the world, across 184 countries. Anyone can join any group, running as little or as often as they choose.

The foot (and hoof) race that pits humans against horses

No matter where you do it, each event, or "hash,"

follows a similar format. A leader appointed by the group, called the "hare," blazes a trail across all types of terrain ranging from woods and rivers to streets and shopping malls. Later, the rest of the group, the "hounds," take off in hot pursuit, following the improvised trail usually fashioned in flour, chalk and tissues hanging from trees. The trails often range from 3 to 6 miles and end with a set of traditions involving songs, beer and good cheer.

"One interesting aspect of hashing is, you meet folks you'd never meet any other way," Remsen said. "And you see places you'd never see any other way. I've met bank presidents and airline pilots and doctors, and folks with doctorates in esoteric degrees. And also, you've just got run-of-the-mill folks."



Remsen, 73, started running hashes in 1980, in Pittsburgh. Soon, he had moved to Tokyo where he continued running with a local group there. He has now hashed in 13 countries across four continents.

Today, he leads the Pinelake Hash in Atlanta, where he has run over 700 of the more than 2,000 hashes he has logged.

"The only thing we all have in common," Remsen said, "is that we're all fairly athletic." Nowadays, though, Remsen walks most of the trails, so even athleticism can hardly be considered a requirement.

Members often joke that Hash House Harriers is a "drinking club with a running problem," so competition or racing is frowned upon. Runners who show up to events clad in 5K race t-shirts are labeled "race-ist."

Within his tribe, however, Remsen is known by a different moniker: "Shiggy Pits," which he says is "hash jargon for a muddy area." Most people, he said, earn their hash name after their fifth trail.

The hash name traditions are so deeply entrenched in the culture of the groups that many do not actually know the real names of other members. Calling someone by their real name on a trail can carry a "penalty," often involving drinking more beer at the end.

"A lot of the hash traditions are the same as rugby traditions," Remsen said. "And so at the end of the

trail, we drink a lot of beer and sing silly songs. It's utterly childish, and that's a lot of the attraction."

The group can trace its origins to 1938, when British expatriates and soldiers posted in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia, played a game called "hare and hounds," and culminated with eating in a local restaurant they called the Hash House.

The group formalized its first Constitution in 1950, and its founding remains intact today. "To promote physical fitness among our members ... get rid of weekend hangovers ... acquire a good thirst and to satisfy it in beer ... [and] persuade the older members that they are not as old as they feel."

The second group was founded in 1962 in Singapore, and by the 1970s, there were 50 groups operating in 14 nations.

Today, major cities from Atlanta and Washington to Sydney and Bali, Indonesia, have numerous hashes that meet nearly every day of the week.

David Lampp, who goes by the hash name "Ballerina Booty Boy," felt that the "no-rules" nature of hashing was central to its magic and kept him coming back for hundreds of hashes since he joined in 2007.

"I mean, there are some things here that might be a little offensive to some people, but not to others," Lampp said. "So come here, relaxed, with an open frame of mind. And the most important thing is, have a great sense of humor."

Runners World Magazine looks at hashing.

What do hares and hounds have in common? They both figure into a 19th-century schoolboy game that evolved into the sport of cross country—and also launched a popular drinking and running club as we know it today.

The term "harrier" is something you don't often hear, but it has a pretty big meaning in the running world. The word is short for "hare hunters" (and, in some contexts, can also refer to a type of hound bred to hunt hares). In the 1830s, schoolboys in England came up with a game they called Hares and Hounds, or simply "paper chasing." The boys who were the "hares" would leave before everyone else and drop a trail of paper; the "hounds" would follow. The game mimicked a foxhunt in many ways.

This school yard game evolved into something bigger in 1938, when **nine British officers** stationed in Malaysia got bored. Looking for a way to work off their hangovers after the weekend, they began going for long runs each week in Kuala Lumpur. The game's new moniker came from the "Hash House," which was the name of the house where **the soldiers stayed** and where they ate corned beef for dinner night after night.

The founding member of the group was sadly killed in the war, but many of the others got back together in 1946 and laid out a set of rules. According to NPR, their main goals were:

To promote physical fitness among members
To get rid of weekend hangovers
To work up a good thirst and satisfy it in beer
To persuade older members of the group that they aren't as old as they feel.

More and more people began to join the group, and in 1962, it began expanding worldwide. Today, there are thousands of Hash House Harriers ("the drinking club with a running problem") chapters around the world. The game appeals to travelers because it's a great way to get off the beaten path and explore a new area—and the promise of alcohol before, during, and after the run doesn't hurt, either.

Hashes typically last under six miles and follow a trail laid out by the "hare," a prespecified group member. Everyone else makes up the pack of "hounds," and they look for clues (often chalk marks) on the path to figure out where they should go. Some clues, though, lead to dead ends—so it's a constant guessing game to find the correct trail.

I have never heard this 'hare hunters' explanation before and can find no reference to it.

The old fake-news story that the hashers were military officers!
They were not - they were civilians from various occupations but with a fair number of accountants. With war approaching they did of course become part-time soldiers. Even so this quote is inaccurate.

Rubbish! The name might have come from the chef's habit of 'hashing together' the weekend left overs on a Monday BUT the food was varied and gets good reviews from Cecil Lee.

No - the post-war years saw numbers decline and at a couple of points Mother Hash might well have come close to collapsing. Outlandish costumes are often involved in these runs; funny or off-color nicknames are welcome, too. And of course, beer is always a given.

Outside of these sanctioned clubs, the term "harrier" has also become a more general nickname for cross-country runners. In fact, hashing is widely regarded as the early beginnings of the sport of cross-country. One of the very first official cross-country races ever held occurred at Rugby School in 1837; it was known as the Crick Run. Hares and Hounds continued to be a popular game, but schools and universities also began holding regular official cross-country races, where—similar to Hares and Hounds—the course was laid out in advance and might include pastures or woods.

By 1876, England had a national cross-country championship; by 1878, the sport had migrated across the ocean to the United States. And in the early 1900s, the first international races were held. Cross-country made it to the Olympics in 1912, but it didn't last for long; many instances of heatstroke resulted in officials pulling the sport after 1924. (Cross-country may return as an Olympic sport in Paris 2024, however.)

No - quite the reverse.

Belgrave Harriers,
Thames Valley Harriers etc pre-date the hash by half a century.
We hashers borrowed the word from the world of cross country running.

No! The authors have confused the term hashing with paper chase. Yes, the **paper chase** might be considered the father of modern cross country but the National Cross Country Championship dates to 1876 - many years before **hashing** started.





Hashing in Hong Kong

In June 1986 the South Side Hash went on-on to the Lamma Hilton, where they celebrated the imminent departure of *Sheepshagger*. Towards the end of the evening, with the restaurant emptying out, some of the lads started dropping their shorts.

One of the remaining guests complained at this behaviour via the letter page of the South China

Morning Post, signing herself 'Disgusted'.
On reflection the reply the hash sent, while attempting to be comical, verged on the arrogant and it brought a stream of negative comments.
One letter pointed out that laws had been broken and that the police should interview the gentlemen who had signed the reply.

The incident faded out but it gave hashers some worrying moments.

There are great runs, wild behaviour and when a lone military bagpiper plays to the crowd there are tears in numerous eyes as even drunken hashers understand that the hash world has changed forever.
